





Fran announced that a collection would be taken to help provide the Chairman and Advisor with tranquilizers.



BETA CHI  
SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

ARTICLE I Name and Membership

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the Beta Chi Club of SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE.

Section 2. Registered full-time female students of Santa Rosa Junior College who are members of the Associated Student Body of Santa Rosa Junior College are eligible for membership.

Section 3. Prospective members will sign a list on the Club Day of each semester and will be admitted into Beta Chi.

ARTICLE II Purpose of the Club

Section 1. The purpose of Beta Chi is to contribute and assist the Associated Student Body, aid the community, including improvement in community-campus relations, and to promote good relationships between members.

Section 2. The Elective officers shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, ICC representative, Parliamentarian, Historian, Sg. at Arms, and Philosopher.

Section 3. The duties of President shall be to

- a. Preside over all meetings.
- b. Appoint necessary committees.

Section 4. The duties of the Vice-President shall be to;

- a. Assist the President

- b. Preside at meeting in the absence of the president.
- c. Be in charge of elections.

Section 5. The duties of the Secretary shall be to:

- A. Record and maintain accurate minutes of all meetings.
- B. Assist the President
- C. Keep up the necessary correspondence the club.

Section 6. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to:

- A. Handle all financial transactions and maintain at all times accurate records thereof.
- B. Assist the President.

Section 7. The duties of the ICC representative shall be to:

- A. Represent Beta Chi at all meetings of the ICC
- B. Report club news to the ICC
- C. Report ICC news to the club
- D. Participate fully in all ICC affairs.
- E. Assist the President.

Section 8.

The duties of Parliamentarian shall be to:

- A. Call roll at each meeting and maintain an accurate record of members present at all club functions.
- B. Advise the President.
- C. Assist the President.

Section 9. The duties of the Historian shall be to:

- A. Maintain written and pictorial records of the club
- B. Fill a scrapbook of all interesting material and pictures.

C. Assist the President.

Section 10. The duties of the St. at Arms shall be to ;

A. Maintain order and assure well-run meetings.

B. Receive visitors to the meetings

C. Assist the President

#### ARTICLE III Secession of Officers

Section 1. The Vice President of the Club shall succeed to the office of President upon the resignation of the latter.

Section 2. In the case of a vacancy in any elective officer other than the Presidency, a special election shall be held as soon as possible after the vacancy.

Section 3. Impeachment:

Impeachment shall be according to Strugus-standard code of parliamentary procedure 2nd addition. It shall take a 2/3 vote of the voting membership.

Section 4. Reinstatement:

Members removed from the club may appeal at the next meeting subject to majority vote of the membership.

Section 5. Elections:

Elections of Officers shall take place the last meeting of the semester. The term of office shall be for up to two semesters.

#### ARTICLE IV Meetings.

Section 1. The club shall meeting once a week at a time and date set at the first meeting of the semester.

Section 2. A quorum shall consist of one half plus one of the total membership.

#### ARTICLE V Amendments

Section 1. Any active member may submit an amendment to this Constitution.

Section 2. An amendment to this Constitution may be proposed by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting.

#### ARTICLE VI Ratification

Section 1. This constitution shall become effective upon acceptance off ICC and 2/3 approval of the membership;






