

May 26, 1970
Meeting #16

- I. Call to Order
Chairman Steve Cabot called the last meeting of the semester to order at 12:13 p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
George Prentice led the flag salute.
- III. Roll Call
There were 20 club representatives present. Five were absent, those being the Black Student Union, Current Affairs, the Mexican-American Student Confederation, Ski Club and the Aggies. Two club were excused---Hiking Club and Veterans for Peace.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- V. Approval of Minutes
Ken Beyries asked that the wording under "B. FROM THE FLOOR" be changed to read correctly. The sentence now reads, "That motion was not voted upon, although Ken Beyries' motion to table the original motion by the Veterans for Peace representative was then voted upon and passed." The minutes were then approved as corrected.
- VI. Reports
 - A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot said that he thought Kaleidoscope "was a gas." The Peace Coalition helped in getting some of the entertainment, such as the Hare Krishna.
 - B. VICE-CHAIRMAN: George Prentice said that he had no report but that he would just like to thank^{all} for coming to the meetings. He expressed his thanks for himself, for Chairman Steve Cabot and Secretary Eileen Dougan to the ICC body.
 - C. SECRETARY: Eileen Dougan mentioned that 2 clubs have been absent for 3 meetings, those being the Black Student Union and the Ski Club. Ken Beyries moved to excuse the absences including their attending fines. The motion was carried.
 - D. PARLIAMENTARIAN: Bob Hall was absent.
 - E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Ken Beyries reported that the CSA approved the allotting of \$10 to the Oakman fund. Also, a move to void the songleader elections failed.

F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari thanked all the clubs for their active participation in the college the past semester. The clubs make the campus interesting and he thinks, adds to the educational dimension of the college. Mr. Canevari gave a special thanks to individual clubs for their help on specific projects. He thanked the ICC Secretary for fulfilling her job well all semester. He then thanked Steve Cabot for a job as ICC Chairman very well done, in holding ICC together and doing "an exceptional job."

VII. Old Business

A. CLUB RECORDS: Chairman Steve Cabot asked that each club fill out a form with the names, addresses and phone numbers of key people in the club who the new ICC Chairman would be able to contact over the summer. He asked that clubs turn them in to the Student Activities Office this week.

B. FROM THE FLOOR: The matter of ICC supporting or not supporting the newspaper Together was brought up. Confusion arose over the matter of the meaning of a "no" vote and of the motion itself. As the motion stood---ICC supports the student newspaper, Together---it was voted down by the ICC.

VIII. New Business

A. PRESENTATION OF BEST CLUB TROPHY AWARD: The judging committee, comprised of Charles Crocker, Rosa Mar, Mr. Canevari and Dr. Dougan met informally Monday morning. Their decision of the winner was the Women's Luncheon Club. They were presented the trophy with congratulations.

B. INTRODUCTION OF NEW ICC CHAIRMAN: Chairman Steve Cabot introduced next semester's Student Body Vice President and the Inter-Club Council's new Chairman, Mark Karahadian. Mark won the run-off election by a vote of almost 2 to 1. Mark then spoke a little about his aspirations for next semester. He believed that his support came from the clubs since that is where the strength of the college lies. He stated that he would really like to do a lot with the clubs next semester.

IX. Money-making Requests

Two requests were submitted and approved by the ICC.

Circle K is holding an auction for the electronics department of T.V.'s and radios in front of the Coop on May 27th at 12 noon.

The Women's Luncheon Club and Circle K are holding a rummage sale at the La Rose Hotel on May 26th.

X. Announcements

Chairman Steve Cabot thanked everyone again for attending the meetings all semester. He thanked Secretary, Eileen Dougan. He thanked his Vice-chairman, George Prentice for doing a good job. He thanked Ken Beyries first as Parliamentarian and then as ICC Representative to CSA to which Ken later switched. In Steve's words, "It's really been far out!!!"

Ken Beyries invited everyone to see John Steinbeck's Of Mice and Men starting June 13th and put on by SRJC's own drama department.

On Sunday, May 31, from noon to 5:30 p.m., there will be "Airport Appreciation Day" at the County airport. Displays of aircraft, etc. will be shown. Everyone is invited.

Circle K invited everyone to their T.V. auction on May 27th. Friday is a holiday.

XI. Adjournment

The Chairman adjourned the last meeting of ICC for the year at 12:43 p.m. Hurray!

May 19, 1970
Meeting #15

- I. Call to Order
Chairman Steve Cabot called the meeting to order at 12:15p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
There was no flag salute there being no flag.
- III. Roll Call
There were 24 club representatives in attendance. Three clubs absent were the Black Student Union, Kent Hall and Ski Club.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- V. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- VI. Reports
 - A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot presented the final schedule and map of booths of Kaleidoscope. "Things are happening as planned." The French Club representative informed Steve that they will not have their food booth for lack of club interest. Instead, the Student Faculty Coalition for Peace will have a food booth along with another booth run by donations.
Steve announced that so far, 2 resumes have been submitted by clubs---Women's Luncheon Club and Student Bachelorettes---for the Best Club Trophy Award. Other clubs are urged to submit resumes up until the extended deadline of Thursday, May 21, at 3 p.m.
 - E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Ken Beyries reported that the proposed Student Body budget was approved as submitted with no objections. CSA also approved the supporting of several proposals opposing war activities.
- VII. Old Business
 - A. KALEIDOSCOPE '70: Chairman Steve Cabot urged participating clubs to look at the map of booths and find out where they are located for the day. He then specifically read off the clubs affected and their activities.
 - B. FROM THE FLOOR: Chairman Steve Cabot called a Speakers Committee meeting for Thursday, May 21, noon, to review outside speakers for Kaleidoscope '70.

VIII. New Business

A. CANDIDATES FOR ICC CHAIRMAN: (Associated Students Vice-President) Chairman Steve Cabot reported that he had invited all the candidates for this office. Only two were present however---Mark Karahadian and Drake Sadler. Both candidates spoke to I CC covering several topics of interest ranging from the ICC's budget, to the new newspaper, Together, to the idea of clubs getting together, to ideas for a better ICC agenda. Much discussion followed each talk as the candidates were asked many questions and there were many comments.

B. FROM THE FLOOR: The Veterans for Peace representative moved that ICC support the new newspaper, Together, as long as it remains a free, student paper. Ken Beyries moved that this motion be tabled until the next meeting when representatives could take it back to their meetings and discuss it with club members.

After some discussion and confusion, Mark Karahadian moved to vote immediately. That motion was not voted upon, although the original motion then was voted upon and passed.

One representative wanted to know when pictures and articles had to be submitted to the paper for publication. Drake Sadler said by Friday afternoon.

IX. Money-making Requests

Two requests were submitted and approved by the ICC.

Delphi will hold a Brownie Sale in the Coop on May 20th for \$.05 per brownie. They were asked, in deference to the boycott of the Coop, to hold it outside the Coop. The Delphi representative agreed to do so.

The Vets for Peace will set up an organic food booth daily, run only by donations.



May 12, 1970
Meeting #14

- I. Call to Order
Chairman Steve Cabot called the meeting to order at 12:14p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
There was no flag; there was no flag salute. A suggestion was made to find the flag.
- III. Roll Call
Twenty-three club representatives were in attendance. The three clubs absent were the Black Student Union, Current Affairs, and Ski Club.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- V. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- VI. Reports
- A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot reported that he and President Larry Gibson attended a conference in San Jose on Thursday, May 7. Forty representatives from colleges in the state met to form some sort agreements on several current issues. Four resolutions were drawn up, being the following: 1) To oppose war, racism and poverty, 2) To strike on their respective campuses until the end of the war, 3) To resist all draft board action and 4) To urge complicity with all women in the country.
- E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Ken Beyries reported that since CSA had virtually canceled Kaleidoscope, CSA moved to reimburse to the clubs any money already spent for Kaleidoscope. Mr. Canevari, however, disagreed with Ken on that.
- Chairman Steve Cabot stated that he thought that Kaleidoscope would be in bad taste at this time considering that there is so much unrest over the U.S. state of affairs. The faculty asked Steve to please cancel Kaleidoscope; the students' attention should be focused upon the war and not Kaleidoscope.
- Dr. Garth Dougan then spoke about Kaleidoscope. He was very apologetic saying that there is a place for an event like Kaleidoscope, but that the events of the past few days make Kaleidoscope unimportant. He assured everyone that he was not degrading Kaleidoscope, that it in itself would detract from the current war/peace emphasis. Also, in light of the 2 school days already lost, Dr. Newman must deny the cancelation of classes for 2 more days. He would, however, support a part of a day or something else in its stead.

VII. Old Business

A. BEST CLUB TROPHY AWARD CODE: Chairman Steve Cabot reminded clubs that their club activity resumes must be submitted by next Tuesday, May 19th. Mr. Canevari asked clubs to be sure to remember 3 things on their activity sheets; 1) place the right activities in the proper categories, 2) record that amount of time and the number of club members involved in the activities and 3) estimate the number of current, reasonably active members in the club.

Nominations were then open to elect the ICC representative to the Best Club Trophy Award judging committee. Ken Beyries nominated Charles Crocker from Circle K; Kathy Erickson nominated Cory Spencer from Alpha Gamma Sigma. A hand vote resulted in Charles Crocker elected as the ICC representative to this judging committee.

B. FROM THE FLOOR: Chairman Steve Cabot stated that the Veterans for Peace constitution had been approved by the Constitution Committee. Steve read the constitution stating the clubs aims; it was then submitted to ICC for acceptance. Charles Crocker moved to accept; the motion was carried. Veterans for Peace are a recognized club on SRJC campus.

VIII. New Business

A. PEACE FESTIVAL: As an alternative to Kaleidoscope, Chairman Steve Cabot presented this Peace idea starting at noon on Friday, May 22nd, running until 4p.m. There would be a couple of speakers and a full program of bands for the afternoon while most club activities would still go on. The activities Steve asked to be deleted were the Queen Contest, the Ugly Man Contest, the Bed Race and the Keg-Throwing Contest. There was some discussion on what type of activities were "appropriate," but then, the Photography representative moved that this new schedule be accepted but retain the name of "Kaleidoscope."

Before the vote, it was announced that the Coop dance, which was again moved by CSA, to May 22nd. Kaleidoscope in its new format was approved by ICC.

B. BOARD DECISION TO LOWER FLAG: Ken Beyries related the events of Monday night's school board meeting. The original students' recommendation to the Board failed. President Dr. Newman's Advisory Cabinet then convened and drew up an alternate proposal, the proposal being to lower the flag for 5 school days in honor of the American dead. This measure was finally approved by the Board. Ken asked for questions and a short but fairly hot discussion followed.

IX. Money-making Requests

Four requests were submitted to and approved by ICC.

Mens Luncheon Club will hold their "Rent-an-Escort" on Wednesday, May 13th, in front of the Coop. No male bidding.

Mens Luncheon Club will hold a carwash on Saturday, May 16th, from 9--1p.m.





Dr. Randolph Newman announced that Santa Rosa Junior College will be closed for four (4) days. State colleges, and universities are also closed.

Dr. Newman expressed his thanks to the Advisory Council for the fine work they accomplished.

It was agreed by those in attendance that the "democratic" process was in real effect today.

What steps can be taken to continue the response of the students that was shown today?

Make available petitions and form letters for students and the community.

Request assistance from CSA, Academic Senate, Deans, EOP, and Administration.

Dr. Garth Dougan, Dean of Students, will write a letter to the students of the college for the fine participation.

A letter of appreciation to the secretaries is also being written by Dr. Dougan.

Letters will be sent to senators, legislators, Governor Reagan, etc. concerning today's activities on campus.

A copy to the students and newspapers will be presented.

Board of Trustees meeting will be held Monday, 7:30 p.m., Board Room, Bailey Hall.

May 5, 1970
Meeting #13

- I. Call to Order
The meeting was called to order at 12:12 p.m. by Chairman Steve Cabot.
- II. Flag Salute
Chairman Steve Cabot skipped the flag salute, there being no flag.
- III. Roll Call
There were 25 club representatives in attendance, the single absence being Native Americans. The Mexican-American Student Confederation and the Black Student Union were excused by the Chair earlier in the meeting, but later arrived, being counted in the attendance total.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- V. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- VI. Reports
 - A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot reported on the Kaleidoscope Committee meeting. The Academic Senate reconfirmed their agreement to cancel all classes for the 2 days. To insure students coming, however, there will be classes held from 8-9 a.m. on Thursday. The Coop will be shut down to eliminate competition with the ethnic food booths. The academic exhibits, approximately 7 so far, will be displayed near Hyde Park. Most speakers and entertainment for the days have been definitely lined up. Steve briefly read the proposed schedule of events for Kaleidoscope.
Steve then announced that CSA had voted down the Kaleidoscope dance to be held on May 22nd because of an Associated Women's Students' formal dance to be held on May 23rd. The only "Kaleidoscope" dance to be held will be an ordinary Coop dance from 9-12 midnight on May 15th.

B. VICE-CHAIRMAN: George Prentice announced that one of the speakers for Kaleidoscope will be Clarence Burr, the only speaker at the Moratorium in Courthouse Square to receive a standing ovation. For the students' benefit, George stated that Clarence Burr would like interaction of poetry with students when he comes.

C. SECRETARY: Eileen Dougan announced that all clubs have paid their fines and are all cleared as of the last meeting, April 28th.

D. PARLIAMENTARIAN: Bob Hall read a statement published by Dr. Newman and his Advisory Cabinet concerning campus activities regarding the Southeast Asian war. On Wednesday, classes will not be canceled, but the outdoor stage will be open for any of the college community to express their views.

E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Ken Beyries was absent.

F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari explained that Chairman Steve Cabot and he have not come to any conclusion yet on the format of Kaleidoscope. Dr. Newman and Steve Cabot will have a meeting to decide the final agreement---whether Kaleidoscope really will be educational enough to warrant 2 days of cancelled classes. Mr. Canevari then read the following motion asking that some representative in the ICC body formally move it, opening it to discussion by ICC.

I move that the Inter-Club Council change the format for Kaleidoscope '70 from two days on May 21 & 22 with all classes cancelled to one day on Thursday, May 21, with all classes cancelled.

Charles Crocker, Circle K representative, moved this motion.

Early in the discussion, the Photography Club moved that the following amend ment be added to the original motion---Kaleidoscope to be held on Friday, May 22, with classes cancelled at the discretion of the instructor; classes to be held on Thursday as usual. Short discussion followed, a vote, and the amendment was defeated.

Discussion upon the original motion continued. A formal roll call vote was conducted resulting in 20-NO; 3-YES. Kaleidoscope, May 21 & 22, stands as it was originally to be presented to Dr. Newman.

VII. Old Business

A. BEST CLUB TROPHY AWARD CODE: Chairman Steve Cabot called attention to the printed Codes and urged clubs to read the Code and turn in a club activity outline by May 19th.

VIII. New Business

A. REVISION OF KALEIDOSCOPE '70 DANCE: As Chairman Steve Cabot announced previously, the Kaleidoscope dance will be an ordinary Coop dance on May 15th. ICC discussed this set-back in planning of activities, and the possibility of presenting CSA with an alternate plan. The J.C. Power & Light representative moved that the dance be re-scheduled to be held on Wednesday night, May 20th. The motion was approved UNANIMOUSLY.

IX. Money-making Requests

Delphi requested to hold another Brownie Sale on Wednesday, May 6th, in the Coop area. ICC approved.

Men's Luncheon Club submitted a change to their "Rent-an-Escort." The date which was supposed to be last Wednesday was changed to this Wednesday, May 6th. ICC approved.

X. Kaleidoscope '70 Entries

All entries were approved.

The Forestry Club will be having a Tree Sale during Kaleidoscope. Seedlings of various kinds will sell for \$1.00.

The Forestry Club will have a timed log bucking contest. Rules later.

Women's Luncheon Club will sell homemade bread at a nickel a slice. (WLC announced their dropping of the Beard and Mustache Contest.) WLC then read the rules to their Kaleidoscope Queen Contest. The candidates must be submitted to WLC by next Monday, May 11th.

Aero Cubs will display home-built aircraft, photos, etc.

The Forestry Club will sponsor 2 movies for Kaleidoscope.

XI. Announcements

Charles Crocker announced the Circle K Pancake Breakfast on Mother's Day, May 10th. "Take your mother to breakfast."

Mr. Canewari then reminded clubs to submit their Kaleidoscope speakers to the Speakers Committee.

XII. Adjournment

ICC was adjourned at 1:05 p.m.

The Aggies submitted for May 21 or 22, a cow milking contest near the outdoor stage. Rules will follow later. ICC approved.







Thank you!)

The Chair there upon read a letter from Mr. Christopher Wade, Advisor to the Baha'i Club, stating their wish to be "removed from the Inter-Club Council at this time." The Chair Accepted it.

There were no entries submitted.





- I. Call to Order
Chairman Steve Cabot called the meeting to order at 12:11 p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
Vice-chairman George Prentice led the flag salute.
- III. Roll Call
Only 20 club representatives were in attendance. The 8 representatives absent were the Aero Cubs, Auto Service, Baha'i, the Black Student Union, the Chess Club, Kent Hall, the Orient Club and the Student Bachelorettes.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- V. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- VI. Reports
 - A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot called attention to the Kaleidoscope '70 time schedule. These events are presented by the junior college as a whole; later, the schedule of club events will be announced also.
Steve then announced that he will speak tomorrow to the Academic Senate for their final approval of the Kaleidoscope '70 days. Also, he will ask them if they will sponsor projects for Kaleidoscope.
 - B. VICE-CHAIRMAN: George Prentice lamented the fact of little or no club participation or even individual participation on Earth Day.
He then announced a film festival for Kaleidoscope sponsored by the Vets Club. There will be 4 or 5 films on the educational and/or fun level lasting only 1 or both days.
 - C. SECRETARY: Eileen Dougan announced that 5 clubs have been absent three or more times to ICG meetings. The Student Bachelors' Club representative moved to fine these clubs \$5 payable in 2 weeks. All clubs were fined. (Secretary's note: Due to an error, Photography Club was mis-fined. They are not held responsible for the fine.)

Mr. Canevari asked the Secretary to publish the club name in in the Bear Facts, and send a memo to the clubs, and to the club advisor. He reminded the clubs that they do have means of redress.

D. PARLIAMENTARIAN: Bob Hall spoke about the South Park Festival on Saturday, April 4th. He expressed his disappointment that the only booth to represent S.R.J.C. was the CSA booth. Chairman Steve Cabot also mentioned about the Festival saying that he thought it was a good day.

E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Ken Beyries reported that CSA attempted to censure President Larry Gibson for a letter about Osgood to the Press Democrat. The motion was defeated. Ken also mentioned that J.C.'s forensics team did well in the past weekends competition.

F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari announced the playing of Roadshow '70 on Monday, April 13th, at noon in the auditorium. He complimented the show saying it was great. It has played at Ursuline and Analy where it has received a standing ovation. Chairman Steve Cabot also recommended the show.

Mr. Canevari commented upon the South Park Festival and upon Bob Hall's disappointment about the Festival, saying that anytime you get 1800 people together you have a success on your hands. He thought it was an excellent, positive thing to do.

VII. Old Business

A. EARTH DAY: Larry Gibson also lamented the fact of no response from the clubs for Earth Day. "Are you going to participate?" was his question. He then asked specific clubs, MASC, Forestry club, Aggies and Current Affairs, if they would commit themselves to an Earth Day project.

He then announced this Sunday, April 12th, as garbage pick-up day. Those who are interested, please sign-up. On Friday, noon, in the Board Room there will be a meeting for those who want to help. Friday night, will be a poster painting for the garbage trucks time.

B. FROM THE FLOOR: The representative from Student Bachelors' Club asked that "Money-making Requests" be changed on the agenda to item "A" under New Business. The Chair approved George Prentice, Vice-chairman asked people to ask their teachers to announce the garbage day to their classes.

VIII. New Business

A. MONEY-MAKING REQUESTS: Rich asked that those clubs wanting Oak Leaf publicity for their events to fill out a blank for that purpose.

On April 24th, the Student Bachelors' Club is planning a 1st Annual Spring Grand Prix Soap Box Push Car Derby at the entry fee of \$5.00. Upon explaining a few rules they announced that the last day would be the 23rd to sign up. Upon the French Club representative's motion, ICC approved.

Also, on April 24th or May 1st, the ethnic-oriented clubs--- French, Black Student Union, Orient and MASC---are planning food booths with the Orient Club demonstrating karate, judo and fencing. ICC approved.

The French Club is planning a booth on Saturday, April 18th, to sell things at the Redwood Empire Girl Scouts Flea Market. ICC gave its approval to the activity.

On April 11th, the Aggies are holding a Bake Sale in Coddington. Upon the LDSSA representative's motion, ICC approved.

Delphi is planning a carwash on April 18th, from 9am-3pm at the Shell station on the corner of 4th and Farmers' Lane for the price of 1 dollar per car. The LDSSA representative moved to accept the proposal and ICC approved.

Delphi again is holding another Brownie Sale. The sale, held on April 8th in front of the Coop, will have brownies for \$.05 apiece from 11am-1pm.

B. WAR MORATORIUM: Mike Archibald announced the War Moratorium on Wednesday, April 18th. The day will feature a class boycott by those students who wish. On the outdoor stage from 9-11:30am will be a speaker. At 11:45 will start a march to Courthouse Square where there will be speakers, mostly ethnic, and music.

C. VALUES IN LIFE WEEK: Mark Karahadian spoke about this week coming up, April 13-17. Originally, it was set up for students to re-evaluate spiritual and moral issues. Planned speakers for the week are Mike Wurmbrandt from Los Angeles and James Weston from Berkeley. Mark said that efforts to plan the week were greatly hampered by the lack of a budget and only interest from 1 other club on campus to do anything.

A hitch arose in Mark's presentation of speakers as to whether they had been approved by the Speakers Committee. Chairman Steve Cabot told Mark to fill out a form on the speakers as soon as possible so the Committee could meet and decide upon them.



- I. Call to Order
Steve Cabot, Chairman called the meeting to order at 12:14p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
The flag salute was led by George Prentice, Vice-chairman of ICC.
- III. Roll Call
There were 23 club representatives in attendance. Those absent were the Baha'i, the Chess Club, and the Aggies. Those clubs excused were the Aero Cubs and the Current Affairs.

- VI. Reports

He said that next week he would have information slips for clubs to fill out in particular to have Rich write up in the Oak Leaf. After expressing his gratitude to the clubs for electing him, he then submitted his resignation as ICC Representative to CSA.
 - F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari announced that the Artrium Festival, June 18th-21st, still was in need of ethnic food booths. The Artrium director, Lois Bainey---in office cubicles in Bailey Hall every day from 10-12noon---is giving the clubs first chance before going out into the community. The fee for a booth is \$10.

Orient Club has a food booth along with HASC, BSU and the French Club. Also, they have Karate, judo or fencing demonstrations.

Women's Luncheon Club have movie days where a contribution will be taken to go toward the March of Dimes.



Minutes

March 20, 1970

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:00 by the chairmen, Steve Cabot.

II. Roll Call

The people attending were: Chairman Steve Cabot, Executive Vice President John Wong, ICC Rep. Rich Truax, Publicity Commissioner Bill Hell, Athletics Commissioner George Prentise and his wife Diane, Associated Women Students Rep. Hannah Maggiore, Chris Zeek, David Hurst, and two faculty members: Mr. Hawkins from the Journalism Department and Mr. LeBaron from the Public Information Department.

III. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

IV. Statement of Purpose of the Meeting.

Chairman Steve Cabot stated that the purpose of this meeting was to get together and figure out exactly what is going on with Kaleidoscope 70'. One reason why a direction must be decided upon is that the Academic Senate's approval is required to suspend classes on the 21st and 22nd of May, and they should know if the project is worthwhile. A further purpose of the committee meeting was established as the setting up of work objectives.

V. Statement of Purpose of Kaleidoscope 70'

Kaleidoscope 70' is to be somewhat like "Bear Fair" only it will be more serious, being a more academic exposition. A problem arises immediately, however, and this is how to make educational things "fun." Perhaps there could be a balance developed between educational and purely entertaining events.

VI. Discussion

Discussion was opened up and the rest of the meeting was taken up with the free exchange of ideas and the possible ways of attacking Kaleidoscope 70'. Some of the observations made follow.

Mr. Hawkins said that a conflict arose in the Academic Senate as to whether they would be supporting a one or two day event. Steve said he was working on this and that much would depend on the quality and number of events requisitioned.

It was mentioned that Delphi would be running a float in the Rose Parade a week before Kaleidoscope 70' and this would be great publicity. The Queen Contest was brought up as another possible way to stir interest up before Kaleidoscope 70'. Chris Zeek stated that since K. 70' was leaning toward the academic, the girls could run on looks and scholastic achievement.

It was suggested that Thursday be mostly an educational day and Friday could lean more toward the entertaining. Also on Friday, there could be bands brought on to end the whole event.

George Prentise pointed out that Ecology is being hit hard now and in order for teachers with these "heavy" classes to let students out, there must be something along this line offered. Perhaps each of these classes could find a project to work on for K. 70'. He also asked what a good way to open K. 70' would be and Steve said he hoped Dr. Newman would make a statement. George then said he felt there should be student speakers also so that besides the clubs, individuals got involved.

Dr. Hawkins suggested sending a form letter to the heads of each academic department explaining K. 70' and asking if there were any faculty members interested in speaking. Then a followup could be made where one committee member goes to each departmental meeting to generate interest. Dr. Hawkins also brought up the idea of having each department put on some sort of Open House, displaying things going on in their areas, their ideas, etc. One example might be the administration showing what happened to JC in the past and some of the future plans.

Rich Truax proposed asking the Forensics Department to participate in K. 70' by putting on a Reader's Theatre or some sort of presentation.

For speakers, it was suggested that the Alumni Asso. be contacted. They would also be a good source of publicity. In an attempt to draw the public, it was proposed to approach outgoing mayor Byerson to speak. Mr. Canevari was also listed as a must although establishing a topic he could "handle" became a problem! (you're not laughing, Mr. C.).

Bill Hall talked about publicity: posters, leaflets, radio. He said the member Area 7 schools should be informed about what's happening. He said the Oak Leaf and the Press Democrat would also be used and that two weeks before the event publicity would be really pushed.

The last items concerned moving the COOP Dance just prior to K. 70' to a street dance on Bay 22nd, and the possibility of Chris Zeek getting a troupe of Indian dancers to perform.

The main work assignments: George Prentise is to contact Dr. Jenke on Ecology, Chris Zeek is to talk to Dr. Greene myer and see about the Indian dancers, Lennach is to talk to Dr. Hattkemper and Mr. Perella, Steve Cabot and Mr. LeBaron to check on the administration having an education exhibit, Bill Hall checking on the Alumni, and, George again checking into the possibility of the Vet's club putting on a film festival.

VII. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at about 5:00.

However, Mr. Canevari advised the student members of the Speakers Committee that hereafter not to have another band scheduled for a Tuesday or Thursday on the outdoor stage because of several classes being held in the immediate area.

B. VICE-CHAIRMAN: George Prentice mentioned that no more ecology day art prize money has been added to the fund. He then presented the Earth Day Volunteer Trash Pick-up to be held a week before Earth Day and to involve 10 garbage trucks with volunteer "garbage men" to tour the city picking up garbage. The volunteers will be obtained through the clubs.

C. SECRETARY: Eileen Dougan asked specific clubs for pertinent information to make the master club information list complete.

D. PARLIAMENTARIAN: Ken Beyries announced that the Black Student Union, the LDSSA, and the Aggies have missed 3 meetings apiece thereby allowing ICC to fine them. Ken asked the Chair to postpone action until the next meeting to give them one more opportunity to attend.

Ken then broached the subject of Kaleidoscope '70. He stated that the idea of fun events and contests was fine, but that the main theme of Kaleidoscope was to be kept in mind---Education. In the competition for Best Club Award, Ken said that educational presentations would be given more points than fun events.

E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Rich Truax did not attend the previous CSA meeting, Monday the 16th; he did, however, report on the Area 7 Conference, Saturday the 14th. He gave a very favorable report stating that the purpose of attaining better understanding between the junior colleges of this area was really carried through successfully.

Chairman Steve Cabot then took it upon himself to give the CSA report. A candidate for City Council, Osgood, came to speak to CSA stating his goals and his hope to represent young people if he is elected.

F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari announced that the Associated Student Body was presenting "Band Soul Expo", Wednesday, noon, on the outdoor stage. Then, Mr. Canevari, also, stressed the importance of having more educational events, because the faculty will not release students for Kaleidoscope '70 from 2 days off from school if all that it is is an enlarged Bear Fair. Mr. Canevari stated that a more intellectual emphasis would impress the faculty.

VI. Old Business

A. FROM THE FLOOR: The Mexican-American Students Confederation corrected their food selling date to Friday, March 20th and now including all of the ethnic clubs' participation.

VII. New Business

A. APPOINTMENTS TO KALEIDOSCOPE '70 COMMITTEE: Mr. Don Emblen and Mr. John LeBaron visited the ICC as representatives of the Academic Senate. Since they came to find out what exactly the students' thinking is on such an event, there was much discussion touching on what Chairman Steve Cabot and Mr. Canevari and Ken Beyries talked about earlier in the meeting.

Steve Cabot then preceeded to name the students already on this Kaleidoscope '70 Committee, being Mr. Canevari, Steve Caffrey, Jeff Hess and Rich Truax. Added to the list from ICC were George Prentice, Dave Hurst and Ken Beyries. Steve Cabot was left to set up a suitable time and place for a meeting.

Steve Cabot, himself, made a very strong pitch for educationally oriented events, exhibitions and presentations. Steve sees Kaleidoscope as an academic festival that would be creative and new, unlike the old Bear Fair. He urged clubs to begin offering more totally artistic things. A more "total, all-around" festival is what Steve is aiming for.

VIII. Money-making Requests

MASC, French Club, Orient Club and Native Americans requested to have a food sake from 11-1 pm on the Coop porch on March 20th. ICC approved.

To pay for their upcoming float in the Santa Rosa Rose Parade, Delphi asked to hold a bottle drive on April 4th. ICC approved.

ICC then approved the Student Bachelorettes request to hold a Slave Day on March 18th (a change from the 17th) on the Coop porch.

Another request from Delphi asked to hold a brownie sale---\$.05 a brownie---on Wednesday, March 18th. ICC approved.

IX. Kaleidoscope '70 Entries

For Kaleidoscope, the Social Science 10 classes received the approval of ICC to plan as a class project an art display on the S Sonoma County environment.

Approval of the Orient Club's request to hold a fencing, karate, and judo demonstration was suspended pending further information on the display.

Kent Hall received approval of ICC to hold an "Ugly Person Contest" at an entry fee of \$5.00 with the clubs nomination candidates, the student body voting and an "Ugly Person" crowned.



Minutes

- I. Call to Order
Chairman Steve Cabot called the meeting to order at 12:12 p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
The flag being absent again, the Chairman dispensed with the flag salute.
- III. Roll Call
Twenty-five club representatives were in attendance. The 3 clubs absent were the Student Bachelors Club, the Student Bachelor-ettes and the Aggies.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
Item "B" under New Business, "Smoking in ICC" was changed to item "C" under Old Business making the rest of the numbering fit the altered agenda. The agenda was then approved as altered.
- V. Approval of Minutes
George Prentice asked that the Vets Club be recorded as excused for the last ICC meeting because the representative was ill. The Chair accepted this request. The minutes were then approved as written.
- VI. Reports
 - A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot announced the Area 7 Conference to be held at SRJC on Saturday, March 14th. Jeff Hess, Area 7 President, has invited anyone to come and listen to the general meetings at 9-10:30 a.m. or 3-4:30 p.m. and find out what is being accomplished in student government.
Tuesday night, 7:30 p.m., March 10th, there will be the First 17th Annual Action Session held at the Resurrection Church for the purpose of airing gripes about schools. All are invited.
Steve then arranged the meeting of the students who belong to the Speakers Committee to review 2 off-campus speakers requests made by the Current Affairs Club. Friday at noon was the date.
 - B. VICE-CHAIRMAN: George Prentice made several announcements to ICC from outside sources. One invited all interested students to attend a native costume, dances and folklore exhibition at Cabrillo College on April 10th. Another was a letter from a Life Member of the Academy of Political Science. All interested should contact George. A concert announcement was dropped for lack of information.
George then presented the need to accumulate more prize money to be given to the 3 best pieces of artwork on ecology on Earth Day. George asked that individual clubs give a small amount to help raise \$100 to add to the prize money fund.

E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE: Rich Truax reported the activities of CSA from last Monday's meeting, March 9th. The forensics team was granted \$705 to attend the area championships. The Area 7 Conference was announced. Dave Smith was granted money by CSA to enable some Pomo Indians to come to SRJC and give an exhibition and demonstrate the Pomo tradition and culture.

F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari announced that the SRJC was short 1 delegate to the Area 7 Conference Ecology Workshop.

VIII. Old Business

A. REPORTS ON CARWASHES: The Circle K, Women's Luncheon Club, and the Men's Luncheon Club all reported only small successes on their carwashes. W.L.C. reported that \$32 was made at their carwash. Circle K didn't know the amount they made, and M.E.C. postponed their carwash. The rain hampered any lively activity. M.L.C. proposed to have their carwash next weekend. The Ske Club reported that \$105 was made at their Bake Sale. Evidently bake sales were more profitable than carwashes last weekend.

B. CLUB PUBLICITY: Bill Hall, the Publicity Commissioner, listed several suggestions to help a club obtain publicity for any events they might schedule. He mentioned: 1) through ICC---the club representatives and the minutes, 2) the radio stations on their public service announcements, 3) plan well in advance and 4) ask Bill for any specific problems.

C. SMOKING ON ICC: This subject evoked much discussion on the part of club representatives, the Chairman and Parliamentarian. The Photography Club representative moved that smoking be prohibited in ICC. After more discussion, an amendment was added by Charles Crocker, the Circle K representative. His amendment stated that if a person continued to smoke in ICC, he would be required to leave. The amendment passed ICC. The main motion was then put to the vote with the ayes having 11 and the noes, 12. The motion was defeated.

VIII. New Business

A. ETHNIC FOOD BOOTHS: The Artrium, summer art festival and art show, being held on June 18th this year, is asking the ethnic clubs on campus to consider having an ethnic food booth during the festival. It requires a \$10 fee. If interested, check with the Artrium director in Bailey Hall at the evening college, open from 10-12 noon every day.

IX. Money-making Requests

Three money-making requests were submitted to ICC. The Women's Luncheon Club requested to hold a raffle on campus on April 3. Rich Truax moved this request and ICC passed it.

Current Affairs requested to hold a rally on the outdoor stage on March 17 to sell Joan Harris books for \$.50. The motion was made by Rich Truax and passed by ICC.

The Mexican-American Students Confederation submitted a request to sell Mexican food on the Coop porch on March 13. After Rich Truax's motion, ICC approved this request.

X. Kaleidoscope '70 Entries

Five possible events were submitted for Kaleidoscope, May 21 and 22. All requests were approved including:

Delphi entering a 1st class float in the Santa Rosa Rose Parade on May 16th.

Men's Luncheon Club holding a keg throwing contest on both days with certain specifications for the kegs and prizes awarded.

Also, both days, M.L.C. is selling snow cones and soft drinks for \$.20 and \$.15 & \$.25 respectively.

Women's Luncheon Club sponsoring a Kaleidoscope Queen Contest with each club given the opportunity to submit a contestant. The entry fee is \$5.00.

W.L.C. also is holding a car and cycle show on Kaleidoscope days in which they will judge the entries on specific parts. The entry fee is \$2.00 with ribbons and a trophy to the over-all winner.





- I. Call to Order
Chairman Steve Cabot called this meeting to order at 12:11 p.m.
- II. Flag Salute
There was no flag salute because there was no flag.







THE HISTORY OF WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE

The history of WUS, like that of the turbulent era of its growth, is marked by frequent changes in emphasis and program, and even nomenclature, to meet the ever changing demands of the revolutionary world of the last five decades.

EUROPEAN STUDENT RELIEF

The work of WUS began in 1919 as a result of the devastation of Europe after World War I. The organization was created under the name European Student Relief. Developed in order to commit itself to assisting fellow students in prison, European Student Relief programming and assistance resulted in educational classes assuming the proportions of miniature universities behind barbed wire under the supervision of educated prisoner professors. ESR undertook assistance to thousands of students in war torn Europe with funds contributed from many parts of the world, including the United States.

From the beginning the guiding principles of ESR and its successors, including the present organization of WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE, were:

1. Aid was to be administered along sound economic lines.
2. Wherever possible, conditions should be created in which students could help themselves rather than rely on others.
3. Aid was to be provided without regard to race, creed, nationality or sex.
4. ABILITY AND PROVEN NEED ALONE WERE THE CRITERIA.

In working together on the basis of the above conditions, participants in ESR were successful not only in helping their colleagues in need, but also in promoting a spirit of understanding and cooperation among university communities of diverse national, cultural and intellectual backgrounds. Thus even after the emergencies created by World War I had been met, it was agreed that the work of the organization should continue.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SERVICE

In 1926, ESR was succeeded by the International Student Service (ISS). Carrying on in the spirit of the original organization, ISS gave material assistance and moral support to victims of natural and man made calamities. In the 1930's it aided Jewish and other refugees from oppression in Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia. ISS also achieved a reputation in its concern for mutual education through the holding of study tours, work camps, seminars and conferences.

In 1937 when Japan invaded China and the great eastern Chinese universities tried to carry on in refugee situations in the interior, it was the students and their leaders in America who took the initiative in organizing a channel of relief in the name of the Far Eastern Student Fund.

Other parts of Asia claimed attention as well, and the Far Eastern Student Service became the World Student Service Fund in the U. S. Within the U. S. attention had to be turned to help the Nisei students affected in 1942 as a result of Pearl Harbor. Thousands of university students, American citizens of Japanese ancestry, were placed in "relocation camps". The World Student Service Fund worked with the National Japanese-American Student Relocation Council in relocating nearly three thousand students in some 550 colleges in 47 states.

With the onset of World War II in 1939, yet another generation of students in Europe saw their liberties, lives, equipment and buildings threatened and, for many, annihilated. To meet the greatly expanded needs and responsibilities, ISS established the European Student Relief Fund.

WORLD STUDENT RELIEF

With further geographic extension of the war, the emergency of the situation demanded a centralized authority to coordinate efforts. When large funds were given, it seemed wise for the administration of these funds to be under the control of a representative body. Thus World Student Relief was formed on the initiation of the World Student Christian Federation and Pax Romana, and shortly thereafter the World Union of Jewish Students. An emergency staff coped with aid for student prisoners of war, internees and refugees, supplying books, clothing and food, and, breaking through their isolation, gave them hope for the future. At the end of the war, the organization embarked on the almost impossible task of reconstructing university and student life out of the havoc and despair of the post-war years.

WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE

In 1950 came the first official recognition of the need for expansion of regular activities to other continents. The name World University Service evolved in 1951 with the merging of International Student Service and World Student Relief as an international body to be concerned with students and universities throughout the world in a mutual program of self help and concern. The United States' organization, which officially had been known as the World Student Service Fund, adopted the name of WUS along with all of the other nations involved.

As early as 1947, the initial South East Asian Regional Conference was held in Madras, India, and included students and professors from India, Burma, Ceylon, Indonesia and Vietnam. This was the first meeting of Asian university delegates since the sixteenth century, and a program of relief work was planned for that area. Out of the beginning at Madras came WUS's ever-developing involvement in the Asian arena.

As for Africa, when most of the vast continent was still under colonial domination and the higher educational system was in its first stages of development, WUS had already begun a meaningful program of assistance to African higher education and Africans had begun to play major roles in the affairs of WUS.

The first contacts with Latin America go back to the very first days of European Student Relief when countries like Uruguay, Brazil, Chile, Peru, and Argentina contributed to the program in Europe. A natural disaster in Latin America re-established contacts which had been lost since that time. In 1960 a tragic earthquake in Southern Chile severely damaged the Universities of Concepcion and Valdivia. Through an emergency WUS program, funds were allocated to the University of Concepcion, covering the reconstruction of student housing and purchase of laboratory equipment.

While developing programs of mutual assistance and self-help in Asia, Africa, and Latin America, WUS Committees on the continents of Europe, and North America, Australia and New Zealand have organized programs for foreign students in their own countries, such as the U. S. WUS Hungarian Student Relief program started in 1956 and the more recent programs to aid Biafran and Czechoslovakian refugee students.

THE PERSONAL COMMITMENT TO AN IDEA

The history of WUS, told only in the form of its organizational growth, is incomplete and perhaps somewhat misleading. At all stages of its development, the commitment of dedicated individuals was required. From the idealists of 1919 who gave birth to the idea of WUS, to its present supporters, be they in the U. "Requiem for a Faith" is a tribute on film to the land that was Tibet. A beautifully sensitive portrayal, it captures the very spirit of this ancient Buddhist civilization in all its artistic and spiritual forms. Of interest to the historian, "Requiem for a Faith" has equal appeal to philosophers, sociologists, artists, musicians, students of the dance, and theologians; for each of these areas of cultural expression played a part in the life of Tibet, and each was symbolic of a deep, pervading religious conviction.

"Requiem for a Faith" awakens the viewer to an awareness and appreciation of a culture vastly different from his own, yet at the same time, highlights the basic oneness of the world, the similarity of all men in their search for truth and wisdom, the universal need for religious conviction, creative expression and personal peace.

Filmed in 1967, under the sponsorship and narration of Dr. Huston Smith, professor of Philosophy at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Chairman of World University Service in the United States, "Requiem for a Faith" is perhaps one of the last records of Tibetan Buddhism. It is with deep gratitude to Dr. Smith, that World University Service is pleased to share this rare experience with you. Though never mentioned, and claiming no part in the creation of the film, World University Service feels that the message of the film symbolizes the goals we strive to attain.

Dr. Smith reminds us that while we of the materially wealthy nations have much to give, we also have much to receive from others. "Requiem for a Faith" sharpens our sense of the common humanity, which binds all men together and makes possible all forms of sharing among them.

Minutes

I. Call to Order

Chairman Steve Cabot called the meeting to order at 12:12p.m.

II. Roll Call

There were 23 club representatives in attendance. Those absent were the Chess Club and Kent Hall. Current Affairs was excused.

III. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was altered to include having the continuance of the flag salute as the second item resulting in a number change continuing throughout the remainder of the agenda. Chairman Steve Cabot asked that the representative of the World University Service be allowed a priority position on the agenda; ICC approved. Under "Reports," the ICC Representative to CSA was added as item "E" making the Advisor item "F."

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

A. CHAIRMAN: Steve Cabot arranged the meeting of the ICC representatives to the Speakers Committee with the faculty representatives to decide on a speaker application submitted by the Christian Science Club.

Steve then presented a money-making gadget "Auto-Whis-Kit" to the club representatives. It can serve in a number of capacities and could be a good method of expanding a club's treasury.

B. VICE-CHAIRMAN: George Prentice mentioned that there were a few problems in getting started the spring intra-mural basketball season, but that he and Mr. Blackwill are trying to straighten things out. George stated that he would meet with all interested club presidents or chairmen of interested groups. So far, 8 teams have expressed their interest.

C. SECRETARY: Eileen Dougan asked that those clubs who have not turned in club information sheets to do so --- immediately! Those who had not turned them in are the Mexican American Student Confederation, Photography Club, Kent Hall, Black Student Union, Aero Cubs and Alpha Gamma Sigma.

D. PARLIAMENTARIAN: Ken Beyries announced that the SRJC Aggies constitution had been approved by the Constitution Committee. The Aggies' Representative, Bob Snyder, then explained the purpose of the Aggies---to promote the agricultural program on campus. The Aero Cubs representative moved that the Aggies be accepted as a recognized club on campus. The motion was seconded and passed by the ICC.

Ken then stated that Kent Hall had missed 3 consecutive meetings. He advised the chair to fine them \$5 with the provision that if they do not pay in 2 weeks they will cease to function as a club. If eventually they do pay, they may petition to ICC to be reinstated as an active club with all rights and privileges attending.

E. ICC REPRESENTATIVE TO CSA: Rich Truax expressed his discontent with his impression of his first CSA meeting. Most of the meeting was discussion upon an issue presented by Bob Hall regarding the decision of a disciplinary action to be taken or not taken against an SRJC maintenance man. CSA amended Bob Hall's statement to the effect that a delegation of 5 people would talk to Dr. Newman and the president of CSA, Larry Gibson would see the head of the maintenance department.

Other motions passed in CSA were the following: the Associated Student Body President's monthly salary, Kaleidoscope (May 21,22) replacing Bear Fair and Dave Smith replacing Joe Bennett as Sophomore Representative.

F. ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari spoke about parliamentary procedure in relation to the much disputed CSA meeting of Monday, February 16th. He reminded everyone that a president has the prerogative to "take-over" a meeting, but that there are ways to stop him. He suggested that his political science class (parliamentary procedure) be taken by those objecting to the meeting.

VI. Old Business

A. WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE: Mrs. Gretchen Fetterly explained W.U.S.'s international purpose: to help students, collectively and individually, get a college education who would not otherwise have this opportunity available. She was looking for a group of students at SRJC who would be interested in raising money with the help of W.U.S. for overseas students. The address to write to for information is:

B. CLUB DAY: Steve Cabot proposed that Club Day be postponed until Wednesday, the 25th, because of the chance of rain on the 18th. VII. New Business

A. KALEIDOSCOPE: Steve Cabot now officially announced that Kaleidoscope will replace Bear Fair on May 21 and 22. Those clubs interested in sponsoring an event may submit their ideas on money-making requests to Steve who will then post them for other clubs to check.

VIII. Money-making Requests

Three money-making requests were submitted to the ICC. One by Circle K was passed by ICC to have a car wash Sunday, March 8th in the student activities parking lot at the cost of \$1.

Womens Luncheon Club asked to sponsor a cake sale at Coddington from 10a.m. to 4 p.m. on February 23rd. ICC approved this request.

Movies, sponsored by the Vets Club and co-sponsored by the Womens Luncheon Club were requested to be shown in Burbank Auditorium on Saturday, March 21st at 7 or 7:30 p.m. at the cost of \$.75 with a student body card and \$1.00 without. This request was passed.

X. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

The Current Affairs Club requested to publish a newspaper called the Aquarian. ICC passed this request.





CONSTITUTION OF THE AGGIES
OF SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE



ART. I. NAME

THE NAME SHALL BE "SRJC AGGIES"

ART. II. OBJECTIVES

THE OBJECTIVES SHALL BE:

- SEC. 1. TO DEVELOP AND STIMULATE INTEREST IN THE FIELD OF AGRICULTURE.
- SEC. 2. TO PROVIDE THE MEMBERS WITH AN OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME FAMILIAR WITH AGRICULTURE AND ITS RELATED VOCATIONS.
- SEC. 3. TO PROMOTE THE SRJC AGRICULTURAL PROGRAM IN THE COMMUNITY AND ON CAMPUS.
- SEC. 4. TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR AND ENCOURAGE INTER-COLLEGIATE COMPETITION.

ART. III. MEMBERSHIP

MEMBERSHIP SHALL BE OPEN TO ANY STUDENT ON CAMPUS WITH A TRUE INTEREST IN AGRICULTURE AND THE PROMOTION OF THE PROGRAM.

ART. IV. OFFICERS

ELECTED OFFICERS SHALL CONSIST OF A PRESIDENT, A VICE-PRESIDENT, A SECRETARY, A TREASURER, AND PUBLICITY CHAIRMAN.

ART. V. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- SEC. 1. THE PRESIDENT SHALL PRESIDE AT ALL MEETINGS; SHALL APPOINT TEMPORARY OFFICERS TO FILL VACANCIES WITH THE APPROVAL OF THE FACULTY ADVISER, AND SHALL PROVIDE LEADERSHIP TO THE CLUB.
- SEC. 2. THE VICE-PRESIDENT SHALL PERFORM ALL DUITES OF THE PRESIDENT IN HIS ABSENCE AND SHALL AID AND ASSIST THE PRESIDENT.

SEC. 5. THE PUBLICITY CHAIRMAN SHALL PUBLICIZE AND REPORT ALL ACTIVITIES.







January 5, 1970

I. Call to Order

There shall be established at Santa Rosa Junior College a permanent organization of students, clubs, and organizations known as the Inter-Club Council.

THE INTER-CLUB COUNCIL CODE

I. The Membership of the Inter-Club Council

- a. Each recognized club on campus shall be represented by two members, one active and one alternative; each club having one vote.
- b. Any clubs not represented at two consecutive meetings or three intermittent meetings, shall be automatically subject to a fine of \$5.00. If the club fails to pay the fine within two weeks of notification, the club shall lose all recognition by I.C.C. until the following semester.
- c. Special members to the I.C.C. shall include the Student Activities Advisor and Parliamentarian who are ex-officio members.

II. Officers of the Inter-Club Council

- a. The chairman of the I.C.C. shall be the Associated Students Vice-President. The Vice-Chairman shall be appointed by the Chairman from the I.C.C. membership and with the approval of I.C.C.
- b. The Chairman: Shall preside over all meetings. He shall have the power to appoint special committees and call emergency meetings. He shall have a vote only to make or break a tie.
- c. The Vice-Chairman: Shall preside in the absence of the chairman, and shall be a voting member.
- d. The Secretary: Shall be appointed by the chairman with the approval of I.C.C. and shall keep all minutes of the meetings.

III. The Purpose of the Inter-Club Council

- a. I.C.C. shall have the sole responsibility of legislating and enforcing rules in anything regarding clubs.
- b. Club Constitutions and by-laws will be submitted to the Inter-Club Council annually at the last meeting of the Spring Semester for approval. New constitutions for clubs or organizations and/or by-laws and/or amendments shall be submitted to the Constitution Committee, then to the various clubs for their consideration, and finally to I.C.C. for action. The Constitutions, new or amended, must be in the Club mail boxes by ten o'clock the day of the Club meetings so they may be submitted for approval at the following I.C.C. meeting. Club constitutions should comply with all state laws. A simple majority vote of I.C.C. is necessary for approval of Constitutions if two-thirds of the total voting members are present.
- c. To plan a social calendar of activities in cooperation with the Student Activities Advisor, and correlate it with the College Student Assembly Activities Calendar.
- d. To give guidance to new organizations on the campus in such matters as procedures for getting started, drawing up constitutions, and conducting their affairs.

- e. To organize an orientation program during registration and throughout the semester, in order to interest and assist new students in functioning as members of a club.

IV. Meetings

- a. Regular meetings shall be held weekly at a time and place set at the discretion of the chairman. Special meetings shall be posted in club mail boxes two (2) days prior to special meetings.
- b. Three-fifths of the members of the I.C.C. and the Student Activities Advisor shall constitute a quorum at any I.C.C. meeting.

V. Club Membership

- a. Any student wishing to become a member of a particular club will sign up at the Activities Booth on Club Day, or with a particular club within the time limit set by the individual clubs' constitution.
- b. Clubs may not restrict their membership. No club may use any device or practice which in effect implements selectivity.
 - 1. All clubs who maintain a system to determine active and inactive members, and who subsequently use this system to include or exclude members shall apply this evaluating system to all members.
- c. Two weeks after Club Day, each ASB club will submit to the I.C.C. chairman a list of present members.
- d. All active club members must be registered students at Santa Rosa Junior College.
- e. If a club is found guilty by a majority vote of the members of I.C.C. of practicing any form of selectivity against a prospective member, that club will be subject to a fine of \$10.00 and must also accept the prospective member if he or she still desires membership. If the said club does not pay the fine within two weeks after they have been found guilty of the violation by I.C.C., that club will be refused recognition by I.C.C. for the balance of the current semester.
- f. The I.C.C. shall have the right to enforce the above stipulations in any way they choose within the bounds of the ASB constitution.

VI. Amendments

- a. These by-laws can be amended by a two-thirds vote of the I.C.C. Submitting of proposals and the voting thereon shall not be done at the same meeting.
- b. These amendments become operative upon acceptance by the College Student Assembly.

VII. This code shall become effective when approved by the College Student Assembly.

BEST CLUB TROPHY AWARD CODE

I. Presentation of Award

- A. The award shall be presented to the club at the I.C.C. meeting two weeks before "dead week".
- B. The award shall consist of a perpetual plaque on which the name of the Best Club shall be placed, and a small trophy which may be retained by the club receiving the award.

II. Method of Selecting Best Club

- A. The judging committee shall be composed of: the Dean of Students, Student Activities Advisor, one member of CSA (to be elected by CSA), and one member of ICC (to be elected by ICC).
- B. It will be the sole responsibility of those clubs participating to present to the judging committee upon request a resume of activities that were done inclusive of the semester being judged.
 - 1. Resumes must include material which substantiates the activity.
 - 2. Resumes must be organized according to the structure of the point system by which judging will be guided.
- C. The judging committee shall use as a guideline for selection, the Best Club Trophy Award Point System set forth in Section III of this code.
- D. The decision of the judging committee shall be final.
- E. An honorable mention may be awarded when deemed necessary for outstanding accomplishment in some specific field.

II. Best Club Trophy Point System:

A. Points will be awarded for each activity under only one of the categories listed as follows:

	Points
1. Campus Service Activities..... (Includes money-making activities that benefit the entire student body. ie., Movies Lectures, Publications, etc.)	5-10
2. Donations to the College or Student Body..... (Includes gifts which benefit the college society. ie., books, audio visual equipment, Engineers' Stones, etc.)	5-15
3. Community Service Activities	
Major..... (Includes charitable acts or donations.)	10-20
Minor..... (Includes general assistance to functions pertaining to the community.)	5-10
4. Extended Service Activities..... (Includes those activities that are continued for the entire semester. They must be of a service nature.)	5-15
5. Competition Activities	
a. Sponsorship..... (ie. Queen contests, rallies, athletic tournaments, etc)	5-10
b. Participation.....	5
c. Each Activity Won.....	10
6. Representation at Club Day.....	5
7. Homecoming	
a. Sponsoring queen candidate.....	5
b. Sponsoring of elected queen..... additional	10
c. Sponsoring of elected attendants..... additional	5
8. Bear Fair	
a. Sponsoring queen candidate.....	5
b. Sponsoring of elected queen..... additional	10
c. Sponsoring of elected attendants..... additional	5
9. Attendance	
Perfect attendance at I.C.C. (Alternates Allowed).....	10
B. Penalties	
1. Unfair Competition.....	-10
