

Meeting #2

February 16, 1971

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Wes Fennwell at 12:12.

II. Roll Call

Those clubs not represented were Alpha Gamma Sigma, Aero Cubs, Auto Service, E.S.U., Circle K, Hiking Club, M.L.S., Latter Day Saints, Current Affairs, and Hawaiians. International Relations, English Culture, and S.B.ettes were announced as inactive.

It was moved and seconded that all absences be excused until after Club Day. It passed unanimously.

III. Approval of Agenda

Wes added a Secretary's report as part C under Reports and added Club Day as Old Business. With these additions, the agenda was approved.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

- A. Chairman: Wes introduced himself as Chairman of I.C.C., and his officers--Kathy Saltegaver, Secretary, and Steve Helbert, Parliamentarian. Wes also explained that the first Student Bazaar will be held February 26 and will be sponsored by S.E.C. W.L.C. will probably sponsor the Bazaar the following month. Someone asked if the Student Bazaar could be held more often than once a month. Wes said it depended upon how well the first one or two run.
- B. Advisor: Mr. Canevari welcomed everyone to I.C.C. He stressed his concern for the two hemophilic students at S.R.J.C. and urged all club representatives to discuss Steve Kelley's proposal for monthly Blood Drives on campus to build up reserves for these students. Different clubs are needed to sponsor these Blood Drives from now until June.
- C. Secretary: Kathy reminded all club representatives to check their mailboxes in the S.A.O. each day, and to fill out the Club Information Sheets and return them to her or Mrs. Fisher in the S.A.O. She explained that all clubs planning to set up booths at Club Day must fill out the Club Day Requisitions which ask how many chairs, backdrops, tables, etc., will be needed, and return them to her or Mrs. Fisher before 3 o'clock

on Wednesday, Feb. 17

VI. Old Business

A. Club Day: Was announced that one of two bands, either the Euphonic Mail or another band, will play between 11 and 1 Friday. Booths will be set up on the Coop patio if the grass is wet, but otherwise they will be set up near the Outdoor Stage. Mr. Canevari announced that the individual clubs will be responsible to get tables from the Maintenance trucks, set up their booths, and return the tables to the trucks afterwards. Was will organize a lay-out showing where each club may set up their booth.

Mark Karahadian moved that J.C. Power and Light be allowed to pass out "Right On" papers during Club Day, but explained that the papers didn't carry the name of J.C. Power and Light, the distributors. Mr. Canevari reminded Mark that it was the policy of the Board that all material must carry the name of its distributor and thus, J.C.C. did not have the power to pass this motion. It died for lack of a second. Mr. Canevari explained that the paper's distribution would be okay if the name were added.

The Ski Club Rep. announced that the Ski Club was planning to display a boat for Club Day and asked if he needed to secure permission. Mr. Canevari said it was okay.

Club Day will be held this Friday, Feb. 19, unless it is raining. In this case, Club Day will be postponed until the following Wednesday.

VII. New Business

There was no New Business.

VIII. Money-Making Requests

None.

IX. Announcements

M.A.S.C. asked if clubs could sell things at Student Bazaars. Was said they could as long as they were handicrafts, art, etc., and not food. Vet's Club announced that they still have books and money to return from the Book Sale. They are relocated behind the Coop on Elliot Avenue and will be open from 11 to 1 through Feb. 23. The Vet's Rep. also announced that they are sponsoring a letter to be sent to the President of North Vietnam appealing for the release of our P.O.W.s.

In response to a question about reserving rooms for club meetings, Mr. Canevari said that the same rooms would be available as last semester, but if a club wanted to change rooms, they should see Laurie Beard in the Personnel Office in Bailey Hall.

X. Adjournment

Was adjourned the meeting at 12:30.

PROPOSAL TO I.C.C.

Presently on this campus there are two hemophiliacs. One of them, Mike Clarkson, at age 23 has been functioning his entire life with this very serious and deadly disorder of hemophilia. Deprived of the life giving blood product hemophiliacs would lose their fight for survival.

- A. Presently these facilities are available at school and within the community
1. Blood Bank Fund at SRJC
    - a. Blood total usage at school is not good.
    - b. Blood Bank in Santa Rosa
      1. Sonoma County must supply two other counties other than its own.
      2. With 15 hemophiliacs in Santa Rosa the blood is then used very quickly

- B. Here are some basic reasons and needs for the proposal
1. A continual supply of blood amounting to some 60 pints per week or 240 per month
  2. People to pledge and donate one pint of blood every two months

The reasons for these needs are many and varied. The first and most obvious being that of survival. Without the blood products they cannot survive.

Second being that of a financial state of being. Using Mike as an example in the last nine months it has cost him approximately \$9,000 for his survival. The state payed for this however with budgets being cut back they may not continue to do so.

Thirdly, without blood products when bleeding occurs, permanent damage to the joints, ankles, and knees will occur.

Fourth, the blood bank doesn't have the amount of blood to continue at the pace at which is required presently.

The reason for once every two months is stated by the blood bank of Sonoma County which says, "The interval between individual donations shall be at least 8 weeks, but no more often than 5 times in a 12 month period".

- C. Proposals for a Blood Drive once a month at SRJC
1. Club on campus to agree to assist in setting up and the running of the drive once a month.
  2. Assist myself, Steven, in finding students who will donate and pledge their blood.
  3. Will help in advertising and educating the students of the problem which must be solved.

4. Finding area and times at which to run the blood drive on campus.
5. Blood Bank of Santa Rosa will bring all units over to the school every month. (must be at least 20 people)

The proposal and information which you have just read is to inform you and your club members of the pressing problem which faces these two students on this campus.

As project coordinator and a personal friend of Mike's, one of the two students, I then ask for your help on this all important project.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Wes Pennewell at 12:12.

II. Roll Call

Those clubs not represented were M.A.S.C. and Aggies. Aero Cubs, Auto Service, ~~Batter-Day Saints~~, and Hawaiians were removed from the roll. Aggies and L.D.S.S.A. were fined \$5 for absences.

III. Approval of Agenda

Under New Business, Wes added the approval of nominations for Vice-Chairman of I.C.C. and Speakers to the I.C.C. Committee. With this addition, the agenda was approved.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

- a. Chairman: Wes passed out pamphlets explaining the Switchboard that was approved by C.S.A. He said that they needed directors, so if anyone was interested or knew anyone that was interested to contact him.
- b. Secretary: Kathy reminded all representatives to turn in their Club Info. Sheets.
- c. Advisor: Mr. Canavari announced that W.L.C. will sponsor the first bleed drive for the hemophilial student. W.L.C. will be taking pledges before the bleed drive which is planned for March 26. In response to a question from Wes about fines for absences, Mr. Canavari explained that fines are automatic after two consecutive or three collective unexcused absences, but that the club being fined could appeal to have the fine removed at the following I.C.C. meeting.

VI. Old Business

There was no old business.

VII. New Business

- a. Wes explained that three children attending the S.R.J.C. Nursery School needed someone to pay their juice and cracker fees. The following amounts were needed: \$10.

\$12, and \$18. He asked that some club sponsor each of the three children this semester. Mr. Canevari added that only the children of S.R.J.C. students could attend the Nursery School and that the parents of these three children could not afford the fees. Vet's and W.L.C. tentatively pledged to split the total fees of the three children half and half. After they check with their members, they will notify I.C.C.

- b. I.C.C. unanimously approved Wes's nominations of Mark Karahadian for I.C.C. Vice-Chairman and three student speakers to the I.C.C. Speaker Committee: Wes Fennwell, Greg Smith, and Sheri Francisco. Wes explained the purpose of this committee: a speaker brought by a club to speak to the campus at ~~large~~<sup>large</sup> meetings must be approved by the I.C.C. Speaker Committee.
- c. From the floor: Mark Karahadian asked for I.C.C.'s approval to change the name of J.C. Power and Light to Agape. The approval was unanimous. Tom Boyd submitted the constitution for the Chess Club which will go to the Constitution Committee for approval.

#### VIII. Money-Making Requests

The Hiking Club submitted a request for a Bottle Drive, March 6th. The representative explained that members of the club would go door-to-door collecting bottles. I.C.C. approved the request.

#### IX. Announcements

Mr. Canevari complimented Wes and Greg Smith on the Student Bazaar. He said that there appeared to be much student interest. Someone suggested that the next Student Bazaar be planned near the beginning of the month when students have more money to spend. W.L.C. will sponsor the next one, Mr. Canevari added.

A student from The Student International Meditation Society explained that the S.I.M.S. wanted to hold an introductory lecture on campus soon and wanted I.C.C.'s approval to pass out literature about the S.I.M.S. Mr. Canevari told him that he would need the sponsorship of one of the clubs, because the name of the club would have to be included on the literature before it could be disseminated on campus. Current Affairs agreed to sponsor the literature. Mr. Canevari suggested that S.I.M.S. apply for ad hoc status by finding an adviser and writing a statement of the purpose of this organization, then they would be recognized by I.C.C. as a campus organization for a period of nine weeks.

They will need \$200-300 for camping fees, food, camera rental, etc. Wes asked that John return next week with a detailed resume of expenses, so I.C.C. would know exactly what the money would be used for if they decide to allocate it.

VII. Money-Making Requests



I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Wes Pennewell at 12:08.

II. Roll Call

B.S.U., I.L.C., M.A.S.C., and Current Affairs had no representatives present. Circle K was excused. I.L.C. was fined \$5.00 for three collective absences.

III. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

- a. Chairman: Wes commended everyone for their participation in I.C.C. so far, and expressed his hopes that this continues.
- b. Advisor: Mr. Canevari stressed participation in the Blood Drive which is planned for March 26 and is being sponsored by W.L.C. He explained that W.L.C. must collect at least 20 pledges from prospective donors for the Sonoma County Blood Bank to come to the J.C. He urged club members to help encourage these pledges.
- c. Secretary: Kathy announced that she only lacked one Club Information Sheet. She will have a list of active clubs and their officers typed up some time this week.

VI. Business

- a. The representative to explain the Social Science Class Project was not present.
- b. From the floor: Jim Weaver from Vets was concerned about the diminishing number of club members in recent semesters. He proposed that we appeal to local high school Seniors sometime in the Spring semester. A number of possibilities of explaining just exactly what clubs on campus do were discussed. Presenting some type of assembly, skits, planning some type of all-student question and answer period, and incorporating some type of club entertainment or presentation with College Night were some of the suggestions. Wes asked that the representatives discuss these ideas with their clubs and report back at the next meeting.

The representative from Aggies appealed their fine for absences. He explained that most of the activities of the Aggies are off campus and that they had recently been very involved in a local judging contest and had neglected to elect a representative to I.C.C. until recently. It was moved, seconded, and unanimously approved to repeal this fine.

L.D.S.S.A. also appealed for removal of their fine because they had just recently organized and elected their officers. # bigfoot for real?

In British Columbia they call him Sasquatch—an Indian name for a giant.

Along the Pacific Coast states he's known as Bigfoot and in the Himalayas he has a cousin who's called the Abominable Snowman.

He is at least eight-feet tall, weighs half a ton, is hairy like an ape and has never been caught. But his pursuers have photographed him in black and white, on movie film and now in living color.

And it is those color pictures, taken by Ivan Marx of Bossburg, Wash., that have touched off a new effort to track down the elusive sub-human creatures that a growing number of people claim to have seen in the mountainous regions of North America.

This time the International Wildlife Conservation Society, headquartered in Washington, D.C., is sponsoring a hunt which Peter Byrne, executive director, says will deliver one of the legendary man-like creatures in "six to 12 months," under a program the society has funded for as long as 18 months.

The hunt will begin this spring. Where? Byrne isn't saying.

"I believe the animal to exist and to be a new specie of primate similar to the huge primitive subhuman whose bones were discovered in China. These bones were estimated to be 20,000 to 25,000 years

old," Byrne said. The bones he referred to were found in 1963. One was a man-like jaw bone with the teeth still intact.

The society plans to use harmless tranquilizers in the capture attempt.

If the effort is successful, the animal will be released after a scientific investigation, according to Byrne, who announced the society's plan recently in Colville, Wash.

These latest pictures, taken by Marx, have not been widely shown in order to prevent a mass invasion of the territory by the growing numbers of dedicated creature hunters, Byrne said. Bossburg, where Marx lives, is a small village in a sparsely populated section of northeastern Washington on the upper stretches of the Columbia River.

Reports of sightings have originated in areas like this for nearly a century. But oddly none of the trappers of the Hudson's Bay Co., who roamed these mountains in the early 1800s, ever reported creature sightings. But then Marx didn't say the sightings and his color pictures were made in this area.

There have been few reported sightings of the creature in the last two years. But in October, 1967, Roger Patterson of Yakima, Wash., attracted international attention with a strip of 16mm motion picture film of a female Bigfoot taken near Bluff Creek in northern California. Experts who have viewed the film say it is not a fake.


Patterson began his Bigfoot hunt in 1964 at Willow Creek, Calif., where reports of sightings of the creatures have persisted for many years among loggers and Forest Service road builders whose jobs took them into areas seldom frequented by man.

After getting a look at a set of giant footprints, Patterson said he became enthralled with tales of the creature. Gathering newspaper clippings and talking with people who claim to have seen one of the animals, Patterson published a paperback book he called *Do Abominable Snowmen of America Really Exist?*

The project was intended to finance an expedition to capture one of the creatures. At that time, Patterson said he expected to "have one" within a year. His book proved less than successful but his search continued.

It was on one of his horseback patrols along the Bluff Creek Valley of northern California that Patterson said he filmed the creature. A single frame from the movie footage was blown up and released to newspapers.

The animal's features in that picture contrasted sharply with earlier descriptions. It was more man than ape, as most other reports had indicated. The picture was identified by experts as a "buxom female that walked like a man but with a smoother body motion than man."



## AN EXPERIMENT

Switchboard is an experiment in getting involved. How to be a part of something useful. How to be aware. How to deal with problems. How to act to solve them.

The Switchboard is a way to work together without relying on the usual organization forms which make people subordinate to the structure or "the cause." We want to make the structure relevant to the people and the work to be done.

Each person is a whole person who can see work to do and get it done. We know that some can do one thing and others, another thing, and we hope that each person can find something interesting for them. To deal effectively with with problems that arise, independent work is a necessity.

Through a daily operation of the Switchboard, we are considering it an experiment in dealing with the community. By having an open phone 14 hours a day, we will be sensitive to the feelings and problems of the people. By having this perspective, we can become aware of the problems that must be dealt with outside of the usual methods of specialized departments or research teams.

We feel the importance of relating to the whole person rather than just to specific problems. A single call for information may result in the giving of many kinds of information. It may range from a person calling to meet a specific need all the way to that person's involvement in the solution of his problem or need. We hope that many people can be valuable information sources because of what they do or have learned in their experiences. Some people have specialized knowledge of procedures and techniques used when dealing with the bureaucratic system. Others have skills or access to supplies of little use to them which may be valuable to others.

We are experimenting with ways to use this latent talent pool. A resource person works to help another deal with his human situations and is not selected or rejected on religious, political or racial grounds. He is selected on the criterion of whether or not he can do the work or provide the resource. This criterion of helping people on a

human basis leads to what we feel is the one most important aspect of this experimental social organization.

In a time of struggles for power and polarization, the Switchboard is an organization which does not seek power for itself or for others as a group. The Switchboard is basically a medium through which individuals gain access to the information and resources which can allow them to deal with the forces affecting their lives. We have found, for example, that, given a chance to be useful, many of the people working in some of the large organizations known to be indifferent and impersonal, can supply information which can enable others to deal with those organizations on a more personal level. We feel that when people relate with others on a working basis, each person becomes better able to understand the other's perspective.

The Switchboard does not take political positions nor does it endorse one life style over another. By the very nature of its work, it recognizes and respects every person regardless of his views, color, or style of life.

In conclusion, the Switchboard can be a part of the campus and the community if you let it be. The Switchboard can be a valuable asset to the community's media needs. If you have or need information, let us know and we will be glad to cooperate. To be effective, the Switchboard must receive as well as dispense information.





ACADEMIC SENATE

MINUTES of the meeting of Wednesday, March 10, 1971.

Mr. Sherak, presiding, called for approval of the minutes of the meeting of February 24, 1971. It was moved and seconded that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.

Correspondence from the Committee on Committees with regard to its re-formation was read. Mr. Sherak reappointed Messrs. Hobart and Macpherson to the Committee. Miss Yamamoto was mentioned as a possible replacement for Miss Spain. Mr. Sherak indicated that he would report back to the Senate on the membership at the next meeting.

Another piece of correspondence from the Committee on Committees relating to the appointments made to the Ethnic Studies Committee was read and made a part of record.

Mr. Sherak announced the formation of a new ad hoc committee appointed by the Clearing House Committee to undertake work on the revision of campus conduct guidelines and further indicated that work is beginning to proceed.

Mr. Tauzer made a few introductory remarks relating to the subject of campus master-planning. He indicated of the reactivation of the Finance Committee which will begin to meet on a regular basis in order to carry out their assigned functions in terms of short-range as well as long-range planning. Several questions were directed concerning the role of the Finance Committee in master planning. It was indicated that the Committee is in the process of determining what its role should be in terms of kinds of decisions it can make, its powers, etc. Other questions related to the possibility of second campus site as well as other alternatives to alleviate the press of high enrollment. Among those mentioned were the acquisition of the Two Rock property, cooperative agreement with Marin, off-campus parking with bus service to the campus.

Mr. Giles, Chairman of the Salary Committee, reported of the presentation of the salary proposal to the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Bower, Chairman of the Professional Relations Committee, presented a report of the proceedings emanating from the Staff Satisfaction Survey. A set of recommendations was presented for Senate consideration. It was anticipated that these would be voted on at the following meeting after the Senate has had time to give them consideration.

Mr. Sherak presented the proposed changes to the ASCCC constitution. Action will be taken at the next meeting in order to allow time for the Senate to review those changes.

Mr. E. Peterson expressed concern regarding the current MWF 12-1 activity hour in view of more classes being placed into the total curriculum thereby creating a problem with respect to the availability of rooms. Following discussion, the following motion was made:

MOTION: It was moved and seconded that because of the extreme shortage of classroom space during the "prime" hours and also because of the limited number of students who take advantage of the MWF 12-1 activity hour, it is recommended that the MWF 12-1 hour be made available for scheduling of classes with the provision that no class of which only one section is offered may be given the MWF 12-1 hour.

After discussion, the Senate felt that other points of view should be sought before action be taken on this matter. The Chair ruled that the motion be held over until the next meeting. It was suggested that Messrs. Canevari, Crevelli, and Sugarman be invited to present their views.

WHEREAS the Executive Cabinet again wishes to point out the vital educational value of the many co-curricular programs which should be available to the entire student body without penalty,



SUBJECT: COLLEGE HOUR



My apologies for being unable to attend the meeting today (Wednesday, March 24), but a very important special meeting of the Curriculum and Instruction Committee is scheduled.

As an individual I might have some reservations about the maintenance of the college hour at such an ideal time for scheduling classes. As Acting Dean of Instruction my reservations are countered by some fairly compelling arguments.

Obviously student activities and the extra-curricular exposure to events of cultural and educational significance at the college hour have some strong claim to a prominent place in the SRJC program. More important is the fact that the recent decision to keep "temporary village" across Elliott Avenue does relieve some of the room pressures for next semester. At least the pressure is not as critical as it would have been had the original plan for abandoning the speed-space complex been fulfilled.

Another consideration is the need for us to move more dramatically into the late afternoon hours and early morning hours. Several departments are doing a lot along these lines already and this office certainly expects this to continue and expand. 7:00 and 7:30 A.M. classes are on tap for next Fall as well as many traditional lecture courses at the 4:00 P.M. hour. Science instructors of lab courses will be happy to know they will have a lot more company on campus at those late hours. The entire point is we still have some latitude to expand into the "un-popular" hours.

There is a real question mark on the horizon and that is the speed at which the "section-leader" approach has expanded. Additionally, the demand for rooms for club or other extra-curricular endeavors has also exploded. It would appear that where space exists at almost any hour there are groups, sections or bodies willing to move into the vacuum. While at present we seem able to accommodate what is the traditional instructional program, the "section approach" may force us to re-evaluate the sacred college hour in the near future.

My recommendation for the next year at least is to maintain the present situation. I think this is a valid topic for consideration again next year as we see what enrollment and instructional innovation has done with room utilization.

Native Americans are sponsoring a Pow-Wow May 8-9 at Bailey Field. They will entertain with Indian dances and sell Indian food, posters, beadwork, etc. They requested permission to charge admission prices of \$.25 for children and students and \$.50 for adults. I.C.C. gave consent with only one vote in opposition.

French Club wants to hold a Cake Sale in Coddington on May 8. I.C.C. gave unanimous consent.

VIII. Announcements

The Native American representative gave further details on their Pow-wow which is being held at Bailey Field May 8-9. About 30 tribes from all over the United States will be represented and will be participating in the Indian dances. Paul Ortega, Floyd Westerman, Shannon Two Feathers, and Buffy Sainte Marie are some of the special guests that will be present. We praised this project as one of the best potentially that has been sponsored by a club this semester.

ACADEMIC SENATE

MINUTES of the meeting of Wednesday, March 24, 1971.

Mr. Sherak, presiding, called for approval of the minutes of the meeting of March 10, 1971. It was moved and seconded that the minutes be approved. Motion carried.

Correspondence from Mr. Healy, Chairman of the Clearing House Committee, dated March 9, 1971, relating to the subject of graduation exercises was read. In essence, the memorandum indicated that in view of the positive expression on the part of the Student Affairs Committee with regard to the retention of graduation exercises in their present form that no further action would be taken on this matter by the Clearing House Committee.

The issue of the MWF 12-1 College Hour was re-opened for discussion. A memorandum from Mr. Crevelli, Acting Dean of Instruction, was distributed for Senate consideration. In effect, it recommended retention of the present situation for at least the next year. Mr. Sugarman, Chairman of the Mid-Day Series Committee, also recommended retention of College Hour in its present form. Mr. Canevari, who was present with two student representatives (Miss Nancy Delman and Mr. David Herrington), submitted a resolution to the Senate from the Executive Cabinet. The resolution called for vigorous support of the present provisions of College Hour. The motion tabled at the previous meeting (see minutes of March 10, 1971) was brought to the floor for a vote. The motion was defeated.

Opened for discussion was the report of the Professional Relations Committee relating the counseling program which had been distributed at the previous meeting.

MOTION: It was moved and seconded that the report as presented by the Professional Relations Committee be accepted. Motion carried.

Copies of a memorandum dated March 18, 1971, from Mr. Tauzer directed to the Student Personnel Division were distributed and taken into consideration. Discussion followed relating to the essential differences between the recommendations made by the Professional Relations Committee and the various points contained in the Tauzer memorandum. After considerable discussion, the following motion was made:

MOTION: It was moved and seconded that the Academic Senate endorse and forward the recommendations contained in the Professional Relations Committee report relating to the counseling program to the President of the College. Motion carried.

After Mr. Sherak briefly reviewed the proposed changes to the ASCCC constitution, the following motion was made:

MOTION: It was moved and seconded that the Academic Senate ratify the proposed changes to the ASCCC constitution. Motion carried.

The Secretary was directed to inform the ASCCC of this action.

Mr. Churchill gave a brief report of the ASCCC Conference held on March 19-20, 1971. He indicated that the delegates focused on problems relating to finance, teacher evaluation, probationary teachers, and curriculum. He further indicated that many resolutions pertaining to these matters that had been adopted at the conference should receive consideration by this Senate at future meetings.
