**Summary of President Milton W. Schlemmer's Annual Report**

**Research -** The Society realized its 1974 goal of one million dollars for the Research Development Fund with the Chapter contributing \$2500. Nearly \$3 million was allocated in MS research grants - a number of these to California scientists.

**Service -** Through patient and family contacts; recreational and social programs; group counseling; public, professional and school education, the Chapter served over 5400 individuals in the 13 counties and spent over \$4400 in medical equipment for MS patients.

**Education -** Radio and TV stations increased coverage using local tapes and Society TV spots made by such athletes as Billie Jean King and Muhammed Ali. Board members recruited athletes for the National Sports Committee. Several health fairs and educational exhibits were staffed by volunteers. A number of school, professional and lay groups requested Chapter films. Training experiences were provided for student nurses.

**Auxiliary President's Report - Mrs. Harold R. LaBonté, Jr.**

**Fund-raising -** Former records were broken when the Auxiliary raised almost \$19,000 during 1974! Events included the San Mateo Domino Tournament, Maiden Lane Daffodil Festival, opening of "The Great Gatsby" and the new Christmas Card project.

**Services -** Auxiliary members expanded their Home Visit program, continued the Laguna Honda activities, arranged a number of outpatient activities, including a boat tour.

**Gift to the Chapter -** Mrs. LaBonté proudly presented to President Schlemmer a plaque to be attached to the new Bell & Howell 16mm movie projector the Auxiliary purchased for the Chapter's educational programs.

## HELPFUL INFORMATION

**PORTABLE STANDING BAR** - Roy H. Nyquist, M.D. has designed a light portable standing bar which permits standing without long leg braces and some exercising and sells for \$123.40. Installation of axillary supports brings the cost to \$175.40 F.O.B. Long Beach, California, or contact your medical supply office.

**TRANSPORTATION** - American AmBuCar Service, Inc. offers a new service for the transportation of non-emergency ambulatory patients, using a fleet of radio-dispatched sedans to transport to and from homes, hospitals, convalescent hospitals, doctor's office, etc. A patient unable to transfer from a wheelchair must be accompanied by someone who can transfer him. There is no charge for the additional person. A letter from the physician giving diagnosis, treatment, medical reason patient cannot use other transportation and frequency of visits is required. Service is covered by Medi-Cal (one POE sticker per month), *not* MediCare, and covers a radius of 40 miles east, north and south of San Francisco. For rates and further information, contact American AmBuCar Service, Inc., 1640 Taraval Street, San Francisco 94116 - phone: (415) 665-4080 - Monday through Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

**LOW VISION CLINIC** - The University of California School of Optometry's clinic in Berkeley is on the fourth floor of Cowell Hospital on the campus, and is open Wednesday and Friday (phone: 642-5761). A satellite clinic is now open in Oakland at the Lions Blind Center, 3834 Opal Street (phone: 654-2561). Referral to either clinic must be made by an ophthalmologist or an optometrist.





A 10-speed bicycle and other prizes will be awarded to the walkers who turn in the most money by May 16.


Sponsor sheets are now available at the UCPA's Santa Rosa office at 886 Second St., telephone 544-3448.

Eugene Canevari, student activities director at SRJC, and his assistant David Herrington, helped the Circle K with the dance marathon.

## Dance Marathon for Multiple Sclerosis

The Circle K Club at Santa Rosa Junior College held a Dance Marathon March 14, 15 and 16 - 1975 to raise money for the research of Multiple Sclerosis. The event started Friday at 9:10 pm with 18 couples dancing to the sounds of "Sunrise West". Also there to start out the Marathon were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Jahn - President of the Santa Rosa Kiwanis Club, Bill Stachel - President of the Suburban Kiwanis Club and a member of the Redwood Empire Kiwanis Club. Our Sonoma County Supervisor, Will Johnson, also came by and said some encouraging words to the contestants.

All together we had ten bands play for the Marathon. The rest of the time we had records and John Ballotti from radio station KSRO came out and played records and entertained for over eight hours! Admission was charged for spectators to watch and or dance if they felt like it. We collected \$229.25 just from the door. Contestants had sponsors that pledged so much money per hour for each hour the couple danced. All together the couples collected \$1,996.21 !!!!! All proceeds totaled \$2,225.46 which were turned over to the Northern California Chapter Multiple Sclerosis Society. (They sent the money to National)

We had alot of community support - four radio stations (KSRO, KPLS, KVRE & KBBF), both our local newspapers (Press Democrat and News Herald), and our local T.V. station, channel 6. General Hospital even donated first-aid supplies, thanks to Mr. Baily from the Santa Rosa Kiwanis Club. Eleven businesses donated food for the couples and eleven businesses donated prizes ie: dinner for two, plants and gift certificates.

Seven and ½ couples completed the 48 hour dance marathon. Each couple that finished the dance and each couple that turned in money the first week received a prize. (Eleven all together not counting the two couples that are going to the National Marathon in Pasadena) We decided to send two couples to National's - the first couple (Jill Packard and Craig Sykes) won because they collected \$509.06 from their sponsors, the second couple (Steve Reid and Heidi Henderson) because <sup>they</sup> were outstanding dancers. The Multiple Sclerosis Society, Northern California Chapter will pay the expenses for both winning couples to attend the National Dance Marathon May 9, 10 & 11 in Pasadena.

We felt good about this project not only because we raised over \$2,000 but we learned alot more about Multiple Sclerosis and so did many others.

## BEST CLUB TROPHY CODE

### I. Presentation of Award

- A. The award shall be presented to the club at the Inter-Club Council meeting two weeks before "dead week".
- B. The award shall consist of a perpetual plaque on which the name of the Best Club shall be placed, and a small trophy which may be retained by the club receiving the award.

### II. Method of Selecting Best Club

- A. The judging committee shall be composed of: The Dean of Students and the Student Activities Advisor, one member of CSA (to be elected by CSA), and two members of ICC (one will be ICC chairman).
- B. It will be the sole responsibility of those clubs participating to present to the judging committee, upon request, a resume of activities that were done inclusive of the semester being judged.
- C. The judging committee shall use as a guideline for selection, the Best Club Trophy Award Point System set forth in Section III, of this code.
- D. The decision of the judging committee shall be final.
- E. An honorable mention may be awarded when deemed necessary for outstanding accomplishment in some specific field.

III. Best Club Trophy Point System:

A. Points will be awarded for each activity under only one of the categories listed as follows:

1. Campus Service Activities ..... (Includes money-making activities that benefit the entire student body. ie., Movies Lectures, Publications, etc.)	5-10
2. Donations to the College or Student Body ..... (Includes gifts which benefit the College society. ie., books, audio visual equipment, Engineers' Stones, etc.)	5-15
3. Community Service Activities	
Major ..... (Includes charitable acts or donations.)	10-20
Minor ..... (Includes general assistance to functions pertaining to the community.)	5-10
