NEW LOGO PROPOSED FOR SRJC

The proposeu new logo for SRJC which has recently appeared on campus

stationery has sparked a great deal of interest. Therefore, the Insider will devote most of this issue to the logo's development, pro and con arguments, and its future.

Origin of Logo

In February 1976, the Facility Planning Committee, made up of administrators, faculty, classified staff and students, recognized that SRJC had no unified visual image. As part of its responsibility for the visual quality of the campus, including informational graphics, the committee decided to address the problem.

In examining the several symbols currently in use on the campus, the committee felt the symbols failed to meet strong graphic design principles necessary for an effective logo. A logo should be distinctive in shape and design; simple for easy recognition and reproduction; flexible in its ability to be used in various sizes, colors, and reversals; and adaptive in its application to lables, vehicles, uniforms, and brochures.

The committee, then, appointed a subcommittee to develop a logo which could be used in publications, stationery, signs, vehicles, and other areas to provide an unified visual image for SRJC. The development of the logo and typeface would, also, be the first step toward re-signing, lettering, and numbering the campus buildings.

The subcommittee reported back in March with a proposal for a three-part system and a list of nine criteria for the logo development.

The three parts include the symbol or mark, the signature which is the college name and the mark together, and the seal, which is used for official documentation.

The nine criteria incorporated three basic areas: adhere to basic design principles, reflect the central purpose of the college--education, and reflect the unique physical character of the campus. Using the criteria, the subcommittee worked with a graphic designer in developing the system.

After approval of the College Identification System (Logo) by the Facility Planning Committee in mid-July, the system was shared with other members of the campus community, including the Academic Senate Executive Committee, the ASB President, the Superintendent's Cabinet, and about 20 faculty members in 10 different departments.

Elements of System

The three elements of the system are at the bottom of the page and include:

Mark: Selected on the basis of the nine criteria, the mark contains numerous visual images relating to the campus: It represents the flame and open book of knowledge; and an acorn signifying the campus oak trees.

Signature: The mark with the name of the college in the typeface, Fritz Quadrata, makes up the signature. The two elements are set in specific relationship to each other.

Seal: The seal incorporates the founding date, and signature in a simple design for use on official documents.

Implementation of the system in the college stationery uses the colors of redwood and amber on ivory paper.

Pro Arguments

Those in favor of the new system point to the fact that it is an integrated system which meets the nine criteria and good design qualities. It presents an unified visual image to the community and cuts costs by standardizing stationery, publications, and other visual elements.

They, also, point out that you will never get unanimity on a logo. The development of the present system involved a cross section of the college community as well as being shared with an even larger group.

In the proposed stationery, the colors reflect the soil, redwoods, and sunsets of Sonoma County. Special correction fluid has been ordered to solve the anticipated problem of correcting on the ivory paper.

Con Arguments

Those opposing the system say that the system did not have wide enough dissemination, and does not represent the campus.

They point out that it does not symbolize anything on or about the campus, and the stationery does not use the school colors of dark red and dark blue.

The logo is not traditional enough others say, and the seal with the acorns in the center surrounded by the name of the college should be used as the official logo.

Another complaint is that it is difficult to correct typing errors on the new stationery.

What next?

In a recent meeting, the Board of Trustees received a presentation of the system and heard both pro and con arguments. At that time, they indicated that the system should only be partially implemented to let the campus community work with it and react to it. Then later in the fall after input on the system, they would make a decision whether to modify, adopt, or reject the system.

In order that each department and office can work with and react to the pro-

posed system, stationery with the department/office is now available and can be picked up in the Graphic Arts Department Office in Bailey Hall. This will provide an opportunity for campus-wide input into the proposed logo.

The SRJC Staff Directory for 1976-77 is scheduled for distribution by October according to Public Information Officer, Mike Kilpatric.

"The 1976-77 issue will not include photos due to reproduction costs," he explained. "However, several people have indicated a strong preference for the photographs, so we are going to assess campus-wide feelings on the issue, check some cost cutting methods and see if it is feasible for next year."

Copies of the directory will be distributed to staff in their mailboxes. Anybody who is missed in distribution should contact the Public Information Office for a copy (ext. 4266).

The directory lists the name and on-campus extension of all full-time permanent faculty, administrators, and classified staff. Spouse's first name, home address and home telephone are also listed in most cases.

"Although we tried to update all our information, we still may have missed people or have incorrect information," Kilpatric said. "If anybody finds any errors or there are changes through the year, please call us at ext. 4266, and we will correct it for next year."





Logo idea has SRJC campus aflame

Santa Rosa Junior College's proposed flame-like logo is causing anything but unity among faculty and students.

While there is no accurate gauge on campus feelings toward the new proposal, some observers feel the opinions for and against are about even.

SRJC's logo effort is the second symbol proposed for an area public agency fated to become a controversy.

In 1975, city of Santa Rosa officials viewed, considered, then rejected a three-leaf-like logo which was proposed to replace the city seal as Santa Rosa's mark.

Residents and officials in the city, as with SRJC, attacked the leaf logo as not properly fitting representative of the community. By council decision, the logo disappeared from city buses.

The proposed logo was brought about by a realization among members of SRJC's Facility Planning Committee that the college had no unified visual image.

In February, the committee, consisting of administrators, faculty, classified staff members and students, decided to take on the issue of a single logo as part of its responsibility for the visual quality of the campus.

Several symbols in use on the campus were examined, but analyzed as failing to meet strong graphic design principles.

Committee members felt a logo should be distinctive in shape and design simple for easy recognition and reproduction, flexible in its ability to be used in various sizes, colors and reversals and adaptive in its application to labels, vehicles, uniforms and brochures.

As the study progressed, the committee appointed a subcommittee to develop a logo to be used on publications, stationery, signs, vehicles and other areas.

The logo would mean re-signing, re-lettering and re-numbering campus buildings.

The subcommittee presented a proposed three-part system and a list of criteria for logo development to the logo committee in March.

The three parts include the symbol or mark, the signature which is the college name and the mark together, and the seal, which is used for official documentation.

After approval by the Facility Planning Committee in mid-July, the system was shown to other members of the campus community with both acceptance and opposition.

At present, objections are with the flame-like symbol rather than the idea or approach of an integrated system which would use a logo with the college name for direct identity and as college seal for



official and legal purposes.

Committee members indicated they've been receiving widespread reaction and to continue gathering comments, it was decided a letter be sent to various campus bodies to receive additional evaluation.

Once all groups have responded, the committee will send its recommenda-

tions to the board of trustees along with a copy of all responses. Those recommendations may reach the board at the January meeting.

Max Hein, a committee member and graphic art instructor, calls the design innovative, while acknowledging some will find it hard to accept. He said the proposed logo is "well designed."

The design is a product of Allan Miller, described as an internationally known graphic designer, best known for his work specializing in typography and trademarks. His proposal was the product of five months of effort.

Those favoring the new logo approach describe its design quality. Many administrators and students believe the design meets the criteria toward a progressive and unified visual image for the college.

For those opposed, the design came about without student opinions. They also say the symbol does not represent anything on or about the campus.
