

The club started the school year by electing the following officers:

These officers with support from the membership directed the club in the following activities:

1. Club Day Set up booth and sold college farm apples to students at discount prices.
2. Club Meetings Held regularly scheduled meetings to handle club business.
3. Sports Activities Participated in intramural sports and also played the Forestry Club in football.
4. I.C.C. Meetings Participated in every meeting this year.
5. Student Government Supported two agriculture majors as candidates for ASB offices (Ken Johnson and Terry Lindley).
6. Recreational Activities Sponsored a christmas party for members and guests.
7. Club Jackets Developed a club insignia and encouraged club members to purchase club jackets.
8. Judging Teams Fourteen members of the club represented the college on the livestock and diary cattle judging teams. The teams competed against other colleges from throughout the U.S. in contests at Chico, Fresno, San Francisco, Sacramento, Portland, and Chicago.

9. Money Raising Events Sponsored a lamb raffle that raised nearly \$500.00 to help send the livestock team to Chicago.
10. SRJC Blood Drive Several members donated blood.
11. Community Service Each year the club sponsors a livestock, land, poultry, and forestry contest for high school agriculture students and 4-H club members. Also, the club sponsors a feeder lamb sale to provide project lambs for 4-H and FFA members who otherwise couldn't find them.

Each year the members of the livestock and dairy judging teams serve as reason takers at the 4-H Livestock and Dairy Judging Days for the county.

Various members of the Livestock and Dairy judging teams also give of their time as volunteers to serve as judges for various field days and workshops throughout the state.

The Aggie Club prides itself in the fact that every members has participated in one or more of the above activities. This benefits the members directly and also acquaint other people on and off campus about the value of agriculture.

The 1975-76 Forestry Club

The Forestry Club on campus at Santa Rosa Junior College under the direction of its president Tom Furrer and advisor Dave Turner, had what proved to be the best semester in the club history of five years.

In the beginning we set up goals which, as a club, we wanted to achieve. These goals were as follows.

- A. Build up the Chester O. Nichols scholarship fund. Chester O. Nichols was the founder of the Forestry department at the J.C. The scholarship was set up by the 1973 Forestry Club.
- B. The placement of a stone plaque at the foot of the California Redwood tree planted in memory of Chester O. Nichols.
- C. To make the members more available for public service. To work and achieve projects for public use.
- D. To boost club membership.
- E. To have fun as a group of friends.

We realized that some of these goals would be hard to reach, but we realized quickly that as a team, they could be reached.

How did we reach our goals?

- A. One goal, to build up the scholarship, could only be done by working to earn the money. The club again ran the concessions at every other home football game. At times we switched with the other club involved when they had problems. Our members also went north, to collect California Redwood burls and sell them on campus and at Coddington in Santa Rosa. This also gained more funds for the scholarship.
- B. Members are presently constructing the stone plaque for the Chester O. Nichols redwood tree and is nearing completion.
- C. Arrangements were made through Dick Menefee, Area Manager of Sonoma Division of California State Parks for members to again this year, do volunteer work for local State and County Parks.

- D. Membership is the heart of any club. Not just people who take credit for being a member and never come to any meetings or club activities, but active members. In the past the highest enrollment in any semester had been twelve active members. The goal of increased enrollment was reached by the very high interest of new students.

Accomplishment of the goals.

- A. Over two hundred dollars is in the Chester O. Nichols scholarship fund because of dedicated members who all worked very hard at footballs games and selling Redwood burls. Over twice the amount that was ever achieved before.
Also, put in the fund, were many donations received from members and a fifty dollar donation from advisor Dave Turner. Never before were any donations received.
- B. The completion date for the stone plaque for the Chester O. Nichols redwood tree is near. Public notice of the placement will be soon. A reminder of a great teacher and friend for years after we members leave the Junior College.
- C. In past years the club has taken great pride in volunteer work done at local State and County parks. The record for number of hours being two hundred and thirty one. This semester the club smashed that record. A total of seven hundred and thirty-eight volunteer work hours were put in by members. We are still working and will reach one thousand hours by mid-January. Work being performed includes nature walks, cleaning restrooms, garbage cans building hiking trails and sign construction.
- D. The increasing of membership was done by itself. The club has an active membership of twenty-four people, including a staff of eight.
One of the moves by president Tom Furrer to achieve greater organization was appointment of a staff which included:

 - Schedule fixer - Jon Wells
 - Advisor & treasurer - Dave Turner
- E. Accomplished also was the donation of a California Redwood burl to the "National Association of Retired Teachers of Los Angeles County". This was done so that the teachers, who give volunteer hours to teach small children, could have a living and growing example of nature in their building. It was the thought of this club to donate the burl so the children of southern California, who are not able to see a burl in the wild, may see one of nature's miracles close up.

- F. The club also donated a piece of valuable wood to the Forestry department at the J.C. for use by the instructors to help teach future students.
- G. To be a club, you've got to also have fun together. One other goal accomplished was to get more interest aroused in other clubs. This was done with the "Aggie Club".
On November 8, 1975, our club, in an effort to get some enthusiasm going with other clubs, challenged the "Aggie Club" to a game of flag football. It took time, but they finally agreed. This game achieved exactly what we wanted, a rivalry next to none, that will carry on and bring these two clubs closer. On Bailey field, on eight inches of mud, it ended tied, 14-14. A lot of new friendships were formed.
- H. Members held their first party, a pot-luch dinner, because they chose not to touch the money in the bank, but to leave it for the scholarship fund.

The Forestry Club can all be summed up by a quote from our president at the December 10th meeting.

"The pride can be seen in any of you. Together as a team, built around human beings once all total strangers, now total friendship. A lot of work made simple by a lot of effort, and made into a lot of fun. Together we're the best, we've reached the top. Take it all, you are number one."

POLICY STATEMENT ON SPEAKERS, SOLICITATION OF FUNDS,
AND DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION ON CAMPUS

SPEAKERS INVITED TO ADDRESS AN ORGANIZATION
DURING ITS OWN MEETING:

An invitation sanctioned by the organization and its advisor is all that is necessary. This type of presentation is deemed to be similar to a guest speaker in a scheduled class.

OFF-CAMPUS SPEAKERS INVITED TO ADDRESS THE STUDENT
BODY IN AN ASSEMBLY-TYPE PROGRAM:

The Committee for an Open Forum is the agency of the college which has the responsibility of sponsoring assembly-type presentations on controversial issues. The policy and procedures previously outlined for the Committee will govern such presentations.

The Mid-Day Series Committee and the Public Service Program (formerly CSP) will continue to schedule speakers on topics of general interest.

A "HYDE PARK" FORUM FOR STUDENTS AND
EMPLOYEES OF THE DISTRICT:

An appropriate location will be designated (the outdoor stage (?)) and a pre-determined time (noon hour or 3:00 p.m. (?)) for presentations (formal or informal) by faculty members, students, administrators, trustees, or members of the classified staff of the college. The "Hyde Park" activities are confined to members of the college community and may include debates, prepared or spontaneous statements or simply informal discussion. Any organization or individual wishing to be assured time for a presentation at the "Hyde Park" may reserve time through the office of the Dean of Students. A statement prepared by the County Counsel including reminders of "fair play" and libelous, slanderous or illegal actions will be brought to the attention of users of the facility.

DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION ON CAMPUS:

Every bulletin board on campus will be assigned jointly by the Deans of Students and Instruction to a department, office, organization, or individual or be given an "open" classification. Use of assigned boards will be at the discretion of the assignee. Boards labeled "open" may be used for publicizing on or off campus events of public interest.

Leaflets and similar material may be freely distributed on the Doyle Student Center patio by campus organizations. Distribution of material elsewhere on campus may be scheduled through the office of the Dean of Students. Individuals who desire to distribute materials may request an organization's sponsorship through the I.C.C. The sponsoring organization, together with its advisor, may facilitate the distribution of the materials, without necessarily subscribing to the point of view presented.

SOLICITATION OF FUNDS OR DONATIONS OR
SPONSORSHIP OF FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES:

The solicitation of funds or donations, or sponsorship of fund raising activities either on or off campus is permitted only upon approval of the I.C.C. Any campus organization which collects funds from its members or other sources will maintain an account with the Associated Students so proper

records are kept for all deposits and disbursements. Use of the funds shall be at the discretion of the organization.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY:

Any activity sponsored by a campus organization after approval by the I.C.C. is the exclusive financial responsibility of the organization. Any such activity for which the organization does not have required funds on deposit and which involves a commitment of \$50 (?) or more shall be subject to the approval of the Dean of Students. Approval will involve filing by the parties involved of a written statement releasing the college and Associated Students from any financial claim or responsibility.

Sponsors of the various programs and activities have a responsibility to insure that the normal educational program or conduct of the affairs of the college are not disrupted.

Care should be taken to have all authorized programs and events scheduled on the College Activities Calendar. Provision for adequate facilities and necessary equipment should be assured well in advance of the activity.







- B. It will be the sole responsibility of those clubs participating to present to the judging committee, upon request, a resume of activities that were done inclusive of the semester being judged.
- C. The judging committee shall use as a guideline for selection, the Best Club Trophy Award Point System set forth in Section III, of this code.
- D. The decision of the judging committee shall be final.
- E. An honorable mention may be awarded when deemed necessary for outstanding accomplishment in some specific field.

III. Best Club Trophy Point System:

A. Points will be awarded for each activity under only one of the categories listed as follows:

XVII: Article II

- 1) Delete A through J (privileges of holding an A.S.B. card) and substitute with:

- 2) Make the following changes:
 - Replace Article III as now written with a revised version (attached). The revised version makes the following changes.
 - The Vice President is renamed I.C.C. Chairman.
 - The Executive Vice President is replaced by two Vice Presidents, which are elected from the same field as the President, with the President being the candidate receiving the most votes.

 - Replace Section 1A of Article V with "To appoint officers as provided in Article III."



The trophy is awarded each semester as a way of promoting involvement on campus. This semester's selections were made on a point system for each activity performed by the clubs.
