But Most Fear Losing Jobs if They 'Come Out'

long struggled with a conflict between religious teachings and the treatment of homosexuals.

He worries if the dissension caused by the "Save Our Children" campaign is not "a new McCarthyism."

Worse, he sees "parallels with Nazi Germany." In the beginning of that reign of terror, he said, homosexuals were arrested. "Then came the Jews. Then the gypsies. Then the Catholics. Then the Communists."

"Why didn't the religious people speak out in the beginning?"

Deborah Bradford, who works as a housekeeper, said, "I feel fine about coming out now."

She said her employers respect her intelligence and her ability to care for their children. "I trust they are going to be able to accept this news."

The alliance, which numbers among its membership representatives from various campus and community gay men and lesbian groups, encourages people to come out, "Not necessarily with a boss or the school board" but with those they feel are friends or family members they can trust.

"The straight community can be very cordial and supportive," said Lowe, who added with a smile, "Some of my best friends are straight."

What do gay spokesmen have to say to the straight community?

"I would like to speak to men's groups on the practice of women-hating and queer-baiting that goes on. It's time all of us worked on our sexist behavior," said Lowe.

"I would tell people we are not living in a democracy" said the teacher who fears his coming out would cost him his job.

Because he cannot reveal his homosexuality, he said, "I don't have my constitutional right of freedom of speech."

One woman who calls herself a "lesbian feminist" but who remained anonymous, talked about "homophobia," which she said is preached from church pulpits, taught to children by their parents and reinforced by the media.

"We are viewed as being one-dimensional," she said, suggesting that heterosexuals think "all we do is have sex."

She said another popular phobia is that "homosexuality is contagious."

Her companion wondered if heterosexuals worry more about the sex life of homosexuals than homosexuals do.

The killing of Robert Hillsborough in San Francisco by young men who reportedly chanted "faggot, faggot" during the murder has unified and strengthened the gay movement, said Lowe.

Did he think Hillsborough was killed because he was homosexual? Lowe was asked.

"No," he answered. "He was killed because they (his murderers) were taught he was valueless."

Lowe wore a black button with a pink triangle on which the words "Never Again" are printed. He said the buttons were distributed at the parade in San Francisco after the Hillsborough tragedy.

Lowe said homosexuals in German concentration camps were made to wear pink triangles, just as Jews were branded with a yellow star.

The alliance has already formed a support group for parents of gays who they say have an unmet need. "Psychiatrists have been saying it's their (the parents) fault for years. Also, there are a number of parents who are concerned with the safety of their children," said Bradford.

In addition to turning around the image the straight population may have of gays, the alliance hopes to work on gays' images of themselves.

Bradford explains, "We have to take the names and labels that have been used against us. We have to take those words — lesbians, dykes, gays — and claim them and turn them into positive ones. We have to make them respectable."

The teacher said he has called himself a faggot ever since learning the derivation of the word, defined in the dictionary as a bundle of twigs or sticks. In the Middle Ages, he said, homosexuals were tied together and their bodies were used as kindling at witch burnings.

Sonoma a 'closet county,' but gays are organizing

More than 200 persons from Sonoma County marched behind their own banner, "Sonoma County Gay Alliance — Human Rights For All" in the Gay Freedom Day parade in San Francisco.

The Sonoma County delegation was second in size only to the San Francisco one, say members of the alliance who rallied only two weeks before the parade.

The group organized in mid-June to give each other "some mutual support" and to consolidate a local gay reaction to the repeal of the Dade County, Fla. ordinance and the highly controversial "Save Our Children" campaign of Anita Bryant.

At the first meeting of the alliance, recalled one member, 30 men and women came together with "a lot of anger . . . and some fear as to what might happen here."

Since then, their number has grown to about 50 and their anger and fear have been channeled into "something positive," essentially a gay education program for both the gay and straight communities.

They consider education in the form of talks and rap groups their best tool in "dispelling some of the dangerous myths about gay people" and the prejudices those myths fuel.

A teacher, who is a member of the alliance, said, "I see racism disappearing in the next couple of generations," through changes in textbooks and teaching, and has the same hopes for eliminating prejudice against gays.

He added, "We've all had to go through a period working on our own liberation. Now it is time to go out into the community."

He, however, will continue to hide his homosexuality from his teaching colleagues in order to hold his job.

His sexuality, he states, "in no way affects the way I teach children. It plays no part whatsoever in what I do in the classroom." But, were he to declare himself, he is confident, "I would be fired."

He and three other members of the alliance, who met with The Press Democrat, said they feel the time is right "to take advantage of the situation and let

the straight community know we're here."

How many live here no one knows for sure since there is no official gay count for Sonoma or any other county. A Kinsey sex research study, done almost 20 years ago, concluded that one out of 10 considers himself or herself "predominantly homosexual." On that basis, Sonoma County's population of 250,000-plus might include 25,000 gays.

One alliance member suggested, "20,000, not including tourists."

"Sonoma County has been a closet county," said one man. "It is not a very cordial place to come out in. Most gays here are concealed."

Still, two members of the alliance chose this time to "come out," testing the waters, perhaps, for their brothers and sisters.

Sandy Lowe, a philosophy instructor at Santa Rosa Junior College, said, "I feel a moral obligation to take the risk, to speak out."

Lowe, who is also a rabbi, said he has

There shall be established at Santa Rosa Junior College a permanent organization of students, clubs and organizations known as the Inter-Club Council.

I. The Membership of the Inter-Club Council

- a. Each recognized club on campus shall be represented by two members, one active and one alternative; each club having one vote.
- b. Any club not represented at two consecutive, or three intermittent meetings, shall be charged with non-attendance. The Inter-Club Council shall decide, by a majority vote, the guilt or innocence of any club charged with non-attendance. If found guilty, that club will lose all recognition by the Inter-club Council. A club may appeal to the Inter-Club Council for reinstatement at any time.
- c. Special members to the I.C.C. shall include the Student Activities Advisor and Parliamentarian who are ex-officio members.

II. Officers Of the Inter-Club Council

- a. The chairman of the I.C.C. shall be the Associated Students Vice-President. The Vice-Chairman shall be appointed by the Chairman from the I.C. C. membership and with the approval of I.C.C.
- b. The Chairman: Shall preside over all meetings. He shall have the power to appoint special committees and call emergency meetings. He shall have a vote only to make or break a tie.
- c. The Vice-Chairman: Shall preside in the absence of the chairman, and shall be a voting member.
- d. The Secretary: Shall be appointed by the chairman with the approval of I.C.C. and shall keep all minutes of the meetings.

III. The Purpose of the Inter-Club Council

- a. I.C.C. shall have the sole responsibility of legislating and enforcing rules in anything regarding clubs.
- b. ~~Club Constitutions and by-laws will be submitted to the Inter-Club Council annually at the last meeting of the Spring Semester for approval. New constitutions for clubs or organizations an/or by-laws and/or amendments shall be submitted to the Constitution Committee, then to the various clubs for their consideration, and finally to I.C.C. for action. The Constitutions, new or amended, must be in the Club mailboxes by ten o'clock and day of the Club meetings so they may be submitted for approval at the following I.C.C. meeting. Club constitutions should comply with all state laws. A simple majority vote of I.C.C. is necessary for approval of Constitutions if two-thirds of the total voting members are present.~~
- c. To plan a social calendar of activities in cooperation with the Student Activities Advisor, and correlate it with the College Student Assembly Activities Calendar.
- d. To give guidance to new organizations on the campus in such matters as procedures for getting started, drawing up constitutions, and conducting their affairs.

III. The Purpose of the Inter-Club Council (Cont.)

- e. To organize an orientation program during registration and throughout the semester, in order to interest and assist new students in functioning as members of a club.

IV. Meetings

- a. Regular meetings shall be held weekly at ^{Noon on Tuesdays in the Assembly Room} ~~a time and place set at the discretion of the chairman~~. Special meetings shall be psoted in club mailboxes two (2) days prior to special meetings.
- b. Three-fifths of the members of the I.C.C. and the Student Activities Advisor shall constitute a quorum at any I.C.C. meeting.

V. Club Membership

- a. Any student wishing to become a member of a particular club will sign up at the Activities Booth on Club Day, or with a particular club within the time limit set by the individual club's constitution.
- b. Clubs may not restrict their membership. No club may use any device or practice which in effect implements selectivity.
 - 1. All clubs who maintain a system to determine active and inactive members, and who subsequently use this system to include or exclude members shall apply this evaluating system to all members.
- c. ~~Two weeks after Club Day, each ASB club will submit to the I.C.C. chairman a list of present members.~~
- c. d. All active club members must be registered students at Santa Rosa Junior College.
- d. e. If a club is found guilty by a majority vote of the member of I.C.C. of practicing any form of sele tivity against a prospective member, that club will be subject to a fine of \$10 and must also accept the prospective member if he, or she, still desires membership. If the said club does not pay the fine within two weeks after they have been found guilty of the violation by I.C.C., that club will refused recognition by I.C.C. for the balance of the current semester.
- e. f. The I.C.C. shall have the right to enforce the above stipulations in any way they choose within the bounds of the ASB constitution.

VI. Amendments

- a. These by-laws can be amended by a two-thirds vote of the I.C.C. Submitting of proposals and the voting thereon shall not be done at the same meeting.
- b. These amendments become operative upon acceptance by the College Student Assembly.

VII. This code shall become effective when approved by the College Student Assembly.

I. Presentation of Award

- A. The award shall be presented to the club at the last Inter-Club Council meeting.
- B. The award shall consist of a perpetual plaque on which the name of the Best Club shall be placed, and a small trophy which may be retained by the club receiving the award.

II. Method of Selecting Best Club

- A. The judging committee shall be composed of: The Dean of Students and the Student Activities Advisor, one member of CSA (to be elected by CSA), and two members of ICC (one will be ICC chairman).
- B. It will be the sole responsibility of those clubs participating to present to the judging committee, upon request, a resume of activities that were done inclusive of the semester being judged.
- C. The judging committee shall use as a guideline for selection, the Best Club Award Point System set forth in Section III, of this code.
- D. The decision of the judging committee shall be final.
- E. An honorable mention may be awarded when deemed necessary for outstanding accomplishment in some specific field.

III. Best Club Award Point System:

A. Points will be awarded for each activity under only one of the categories listed as follows:


