Proposed I.C.C. Code Changes

Change I (b) to read as follows:

Any club not represented at two consecutive, or three intermittent meetings, may be charged with non-attendance. The Inter-Club Council may decide, by a majority vote, whether or not a club should lose its status because of non-attendance. If it is decided in the affirmative, that club will lose all recognition by the Inter-Club Council. A club may appeal to the Inter-Club Council for reinstatement at any time.

Delete I (c)

Change V (d) to read as follows:

If a club is found by a majority vote of the membership of I.C.C. to be practicing any form of selectivity against a prospective member, that club will be directed to accept the prospective member if he, or she, still desires membership. If the said club does not accept the prospective member within two weeks after they have been directed to do so by I.C.C., that club will be refused recognition by I.C.C. for the balance of the current semester.

THE INTER-CLUB COUNCIL CODE

There shall be established at Santa Rosa Junior College a permanent organization of students, clubs and organizations known as the Inter-Club Council.

I. The Membership of the Inter-Club Council

- a. Each recognized club on campus shall be represented by two members, one active and one alternative; each club having one vote.
- b. Any club not represented at two consecutive, or three intermittent meetings, may be charged with non-attendance. The Inter-Club Council may decide, by a majority vote, the guilt or innocence of any club charged with non-attendance. If found guilty, that club will lose all recognition by the Inter-Club Council. A club may appeal to the Inter-Club Council for reinstatement at any time.
- c. Special members to the I.C.C. shall include the Student Activities Advisor and Parliamentarian who are ex-officio members.

II. Officers of the Inter-Club Council

- a. The Chairman of the I.C.C. shall be the Associated Students Vice-President. The Vice-Chairman shall be appointed by the Chairman from the I.C.C. membership and with the approval of I.C.C.
- b. The Chairman: Shall preside over all meetings. He shall have the power to appoint special committees and call emergency meetings. He shall have a vote only to make or break a tie.
- c. The Vice-Chairman: Shall preside in the absence of the Chairman, and shall continue to be a voting member.
- d. The Secretary: Shall be appointed by the Chairman with the approval of I.C.C. and shall keep all minutes of the meetings.

III. The Purpose of the Inter-Club Council

- a. I.C.C. shall have the sole responsibility of legislating and enforcing rules in anything regarding clubs.
- b. New constitutions for clubs or organizations and/or by-laws and/or amendments shall be submitted to the I.C.C. for action. Club constitutions should comply with all state laws. A simple majority vote of I.C.C. is necessary for approval of Constitutions if two-thirds of the voting members are present.
- c. To plan a social calendar of activities in cooperation with the Student Activities Advisor, and correlate it with the College Student Assembly Activities Calendar.
- d. To give guidance to new organizations on the campus in such matters as procedures for getting started, drawing up constitutions, and conducting their affairs.
- e. To organize an orientation program during registration and throughout the semester, in order to interest and assist new students in functioning as members of a club.

IV. Meetings

- a. Regular meetings shall be held weekly at Noon on Tuesdays in the Assembly Room of Pioneer Hall. Special meetings shall be posted in club mailboxes two (2) days prior to special meetings.
- b. One-half, plus one of the members of I.C.C. and the Student Activities Advisor, shall constitute a quorum at any I.C.C. meeting.

V. Club Membership

- a. Any student wishing to become a member of a particular club will sign up at the Activities Booth on Club Day, or with a particular club within the time limit set by the individual club's constitution.
- b. Clubs may not restrict their membership. No club may use any device or practice which in effect implements selectivity.
 1. All clubs who maintain a system to determine active and inactive members, and who subsequently use this system to include or exclude members shall apply this evaluating system to all members.
- c. All active club members must be registered students at Santa Rosa Junior College.
- d. If a club is found guilty by a majority vote of the member of I.C.C. of practicing any form of selectivity against a prospective member, that club will be subject to a fine of \$10 and must also accept the prospective member if he, or she, still desires membership. If the said club does not pay the fine within two weeks after they have been found guilty of the violation by I.C.C., that club will be refused recognition by I.C.C. for the balance of the current semester.
- e. The I.C.C. shall have the right to enforce the above stipulations in any way they choose within the bounds of the ASB constitution.

VI. Amendments

- a. These by-laws can be amended by a two-thirds vote of the I.C.C. submitting of proposals and the voting thereon shall not be done at the same meeting.
- b. These amendments become operative upon acceptance by the College Student Assembly.

VII. This code shall become effective when approved by the College Student Assembly.

BEST CLUB AWARD CODE

I. Presentation of Award

- A. The award shall be presented to the club at the last Inter-Club Council meeting.
- B. The award shall consist of a perpetual plaque on which the name of the Best Club shall be placed, and a small trophy which may be retained by the club receiving the award.

II. Method of Selecting Best Club

- A. The judging committee shall be composed of: The Dean of Students and the Student Activities Advisor, one member of CSA (to be elected by CSA), and two members of ICC (one will be ICC chairman).
- B. It will be the sole responsibility of those clubs participating to present to the judging committee, upon request, a resume of activities that were done inclusive of the semester being judged.
- C. The judging committee shall use as a guideline for selection, the Best Club Award Point System set forth in Section III, of this code.
- D. The decision of the judging committee shall be final.
- E. An honorable mention may be awarded when deemed necessary for outstanding accomplishment in some specific field.

III. Best Club Award Point System:

A. Points will be awarded for each activity under only one of the categories listed as follows:

 - Elect officers — at least a President and Inter-Club Council representative. (Leading groups is easy — see other side of page.)
 - Set next meeting time.
 - Tell ICC Representative to come to the Inter Club Council meeting at Noon on Tuesdays in Pioneer Hall Assembly Room and submit Club’s Constitution for approval by ICC.

- RIGHT TO HAVE MONEY-MAKING ACTIVITIES.
- CLUB MEMBERS WHO ARE CURRENT MEMBERS OF SRJC ASSOCIATED STUDENTS ARE COVERED BY INSURANCE ON SCHOOL SPONSORED/SUPERVISED CLUB ACTIVITIES.
- VOICE IN INTER-CLUB COUNCIL ON COLLEGE POLICY MATTERS.
- VOICE IN APPROVING SPEAKERS FROM OFF-CAMPUS TO SPEAK AT SRJC.
- VOICE IN APPROVING WHICH CRAFTSPEOPLE SELL ON CAMPUS AND WHAT THEY SELL.

OBLIGATIONS OF CLUBS

- (After constitution is approved by ICC and the club is an officially recognized campus organization.)
- HAVE A REPRESENTATIVE AT INTER-CLUB COUNCIL MEETINGS ON TUESDAYS AT NOON IN THE PIONEER HALL ASSEMBLY ROOM.
 - HAVE CLUB FUNDS “BANKED” BY STUDENT ACTIVITIES.
 - PICK UP PERMANENT ROOM ASSIGNMENT FORM IN STUDENT ACTIVITIES OFFICE. HAVE ADVISOR SIGN IT AND TAKE IT TO THE INSTRUCTIONAL OFFICE FOR PERMANENT ASSIGNMENT OF A MEETING ROOM FOR THE CURRENT SEMESTER.

THINGS CLUBS SHOULD KNOW . . .

- **GET A MEETING ROOM** — Pick up a room assignment form in the Student Activities Office, have it signed by one of the Advisors and then take it to the Instructional Office and they'll assign you a room.
- **GET NOTICES IN BEAR FACTS** — Pick up a Bear Facts form in Student Activities, by the Switchboard in Bailey Hall or in Student Personnel in Bailey Hall. Have it signed by your club Advisor or one of the Activities Advisors and put it in one of the pick-up boxes listed above.
- **SET UP A CLUB BANK ACCOUNT** — Clubs are required by state law to keep their funds in an account in Student Activities. There is no cost to the club. Just fill out a signature card (available in Student Activities) and have it signed by your Advisor and two students you want to be responsible for withdrawals.
- **DEPOSIT/WITHDRAW CLUB FUNDS** — To make a deposit, fill out a deposit form at the reception desk at Student Activities. To make a withdrawal from your club account fill out a requisition, available in Student Activities, and have it signed by the two authorized people on your club signature card and we'll do the rest.
- **GET ON THE INTER-CLUB COUNCIL AGENDA** — Simply come into the Student Activities Office and write your item of business on the blank agenda on the bulletin board next to the Advisor's Office anytime before the meeting. If you can't do that, then when the chairman asks at the meeting if there are any additions to the agenda, add your item then.
- **MAKE MONEY-MAKING REQUESTS** — All activities that make money need to be approved by the Inter-Club Council. Get a form from the Activities Office or at the meeting and fill it out. Put your name on the agenda either before or at the meeting and you're in business.
- **MAKE A MOTION** — Motions are simply a way of saying that you want the ICC to act on some item. Just say "I move that" and then whatever you want to act on. All motions require a second and then discussion; then are voted on.
- **RECEIVE CORRESPONDENCE** — All clubs have mailboxes in the Activities Office right next to the receptionist's desk.
- **LET OTHERS KNOW HOW TO FIND YOU** — Fill out a club information card and give it to the Student Activities Office receptionist so we can add your name to our listing of clubs, their meeting time and place and other helpful information.
- **GET USE OF A FACILITY** — If you want to use a college facility for anything other than a regular club meeting you go to the Community Services Office in Bailey Hall and fill out the proper form.

BEST CLUB AWARD CODE

I. Presentation of Award

- A. The award shall be presented to the club at the last Inter-Club Council meeting.
- B. The award shall consist of a perpetual plaque on which the name of the Best Club shall be placed, and a small trophy which may be retained by the club receiving the award.

II. Method of Selecting Best Club

- A. The judging committee shall be composed of: The Dean of Students and the Student Activities Advisor, one member of CSA (to be elected by CSA), and two members of ICC (one will be ICC chairman).
- B. It will be the sole responsibility of those clubs participating to present to the judging committee, upon request, a resume of activities that were done inclusive of the semester being judged.
- C. The judging committee shall use as a guideline for selection, the Best Club Award Point System set forth in Section III, of this code.
- D. The decision of the judging committee shall be final.
- E. An honorable mention may be awarded when deemed necessary for outstanding accomplishment in some specific field.

III. Best Club Award Point System:

A. Points will be awarded for each activity under only one of the categories listed as follows:
