


# Christians on Campus




You can get involved as much or as little as you want but don't miss the Wednesday meetings!

# War games are serious fun for some college students

**Editors note:** Games and toys are probably the most common gifts at this time of year. Nevertheless picking the right one is sometimes difficult. And while the new electronic games on the market may be the most popular, some people may still look for something without batteries. A game club at the junior

college provides an idea for a non-electronic gift that is different.

Just ten years ago, the SRJC campus was clamoring for the government to put an end to the Vietnamese war. Today the SRJC War Gamers, a 15-member club, meets three times a week to battle with each other in simulated wars.

Basically, a war game pits two or more people against each other in

strategic and tactical competition until one player is considered victorious. "Technically checkers is a war game," says John Veale, a member of the war gamers, "though it's a very simple one."

Conventional war games are played on maps of commercially produced board games and the players are in command of military operations. King Maker is the simu-

lation of the 15th century English War of Roses. Each player represents a group of people who wish to gain power in that war. These players make alliances with some faction and attack others.

The war gamers try hard to live down the military reputation. Elisabeth Eliassen of Petaluma says, "The actual physical problems of war are not involved. War games are healthy. It's the safe way to do war."

War gamers are sometimes misunderstood.

"A Nazi organization tried to recruit me because they saw an ad I had in a magazine in which I was trying to buy a certain World War II game," said Kevin Burke, another member of the war gamers. "That's ridiculous," he stated.

The fact that ten years ago anti-war sentiment was at its strongest in decades, especially on college campuses, does not bother the war gamers. "War games have been around since 1958 and have not been affected by war yet," said Veale. "They have reached a peak, not due to outside forces, but because their time has come."

"War games and war are different. The games are not violent, because they are intellectual," said McCarter, an organizer of the SRJC War Gamers. "There are some people who are offended, but those are the people who would be offended by anything," he said.

And who are war gamers?

McCarter says "a lot of them are disenchanting chess players." Others

have interests in military history and some play to release tension.

McCarter, who was an avid chess player, says "Chess began to get very cut and dried. There's more variety in war games. Some war games are to chess, what chess is to tiddly winks, complexity-wise."

The games are of historical interest because many of the games are reconstructions of actual battles. The games are played on maps, and the characteristics of specific wars are built into the game. There are games based on the Civil War, World War I, World War II, and several others.

The games are noted by many members of the war gamers as releasing tension. Kevin Campbell told of being mad before beginning a game, and "killing the first person I had a chance at. Of course, I didn't do very well in the game."

The game releases tension in others, simply because of the concentration involved.

There are at least two people and sometimes as many as seven playing in one game. During each play a person must consider each of his opponents and his own goals.

Veale says each move has two basic phases, "there is a movement phase and a combat phase. The movement phase is getting your man into position. In most war games a player may move more than one piece at a time. The combat phase is resolving the effects of that movement according to the rules.
