

Pinball wizards ringing in student lounge

What is the force that leads a student to become obsessed with video games? It's a modern phenomenon on the SRJC campus. On a good day, the machines collect approximately 40 dollars an hour, acknowledged Doyle Center-Supervisor, John Peale.

According to a sample survey of 50 students found in the game room, reasons for playing video games are varied.

"It relieves the boredom around here," stated Robert Pochivi, an animal science major.

"It is a release for pent up aggressions and frustrations due to the anxieties

caused by classroom pressures," said Kurt Jacobsen, an electronics major.

"I'm addicted!" admitted Bo Smith, a computer science major.

Of those surveyed, the average student spends two and one-half hours a week in the game room. During that time he invests an average of four dollars.

After confessing to spending \$40 a week on his habit, areonotics major, Larry Issel admits that video games are addicting. As a matter of fact, 90 percent of the students surveyed believed that it is possible, if not probable, to become obsessed with the games.

There are many theories to explain the magnetic success of video games.

"It's kind of an ego thing," Peale explains. "With the high score, a student gets to write his or her initials on the video game for the day. Each night when we unplug the games, the board clears. It's a shame...the games don't retain the high score."

Peale begins to fantasize, "We could open a Hall of Fame for high scores!"

Back on a serious level, Peale remarks, "It's the pay off of noise, it adds to the excitement. A student pushes a button and it affects something. He sees the

results."

Doyle Center Evening Supervisor, Matt Lee reflects, "If a guy gets a bad grade on a test, he comes here to take his frustrations out." Ironically, 82 percent of the students surveyed felt no guilt when playing video games rather than studying.

Overall, the new game room is "a neat kind of hang out," boasts Peale. "We try to keep it clean, orderly, and fun for everybody," he continues. "I try to discourage any meaningful activity." Peale shares a warm smile, "We try to keep it light in here. This is a place for the students to have fun....and relax."

Deputies break up toga party

Responding to a noise complaint, Sonoma County sheriff's deputies broke up a "toga party" attended by about 700 people Friday night on Dell Avenue in Hacienda.

Four young people were arrested for alcohol-related violations and 10 kegs of beer were confiscated. Officers also investigated the vandalism of a storage shed, owned by a local water company.

One officer said the shed was pushed down a bank with a car, causing an estimated \$3,000 damage to the shed.

Partygoers numbered about 300 at 9:30 p.m. but swelled to 700 by midnight, said a sheriff's officer. Fifteen sheriff's cars arrived at the scene and by 1 a.m. counted only 100 revelers.

Community organizations are joining Santa Rosa Junior College veterans in efforts to save college and university veterans affairs offices.

A cutback in funds allocated to the federal Department of Education in Washington, D.C., may result in the closing of campus offices which assist veterans in educational, career, family and community problem solving.

Henry Yanez, president of SRJC's Veterans Club, invites all veterans and others interested to a 7 p.m. Monday meeting in Room 1509, Emeritus Hall.

A representative of Theodore Roosevelt Post 21, American Legion, will attend the drop-in session to discuss the organization and its activities.



"Perfectly clear"

Editor:

I find that I am concerned by the article which appeared in the Oak Leaf on October 16th, 1980, for several reasons. First of all, newspapers have a responsibility to seek out all available information and to present both sides of an issue equally. I was never contacted by anyone from the Oak Leaf staff and certainly was not unavailable for comment. The fact that this was not done produced a biased and misleading article, and because of this I feel I have no other choice but to write this letter.

The use of certain words without further clarification is in itself misleading. For instance, the wording "misuse of public property" gives one the impression of stealing a building while no one was looking, or at least something equal in nature. In reality, the charge was simply related to the receiving of complimentary nursing texts which my ex-wife used while working as a SRJC preceptee.

The article goes on to mention fraudulent practices in assigning grades. Each of these four students mentioned had job related and personal difficulties with me leading to the termination of our relation-

ship on a very angry note. Most of these students knew each other, their letters were dated within a few days time, and were admittedly solicited by the SRJC administration.

I'm further accused of unprofessional and dishonest conduct. How professional and honest is the SRJC administration's need to hold secret investigations in direct conflict with its own regulations and law? Superior Court Judge William B. Boone states in his 15-page ruling a "delay of a year or more was not justified. Such delay precludes the Board from relying on evidence gathered in secret." Because of the length of time involved in the so called "alleged" secret investigation it made it impossible for me to properly defend the issues. This is another example of why the article is misleading. It appears I chose a procedural defense where in reality, defending the issues had already been made impossible by a secret investigation which withheld any charges from me for over a year. It was also discovered, after the administrative hearing, that the arbitrator suggested by Mr. Chouteau, the college's attorney, was the law office partner and relative to a recent SRJC board member.

Considering the emotional impact the charges in your article carry, I think it is important to put them into perspective. When dealing with charges as serious as these which involve a person's career and livelihood and particularly one's validity and effectiveness as a teacher, it is essential that proper legal procedure be followed to protect all involved. I feel, and this is supported by Judge Boone's ruling, that the administration's approach was unfair and illegal, and it makes one wonder if the charges were justified, why proper legal procedure was not followed. I hope that in writing this letter some light has been shed making it easier for those reading both this, and the previous article, to form their opinions based on information from both sides of the issue, and not just one biased article.




