"Will you do it then, Mike?" asked John. He had never called me Mike before. In fact, he had never called me period. "Sure John, I'll do it."


"Great. When can you get started?" he fished.



Requests also stand a better chance of being funded if, in some way, they benefit the school or the students. The only requirements are that the applicant ask for \$300.00 or less; submit a detailed request and budget; and, be a member of the Associated Students. A project that fits the aforementioned criteria is more likely to be funded for the full amount.

There are also Film Grants available for requests involving cinema, still photography, video and holograms. A major in Art or enrollment in an Art

continental drift or other term projects is discouraged.

The grants have been used on a variety of ideas in the past. An artist used the money to prepare a showing of her work in Plover Library. One student filmed how another student adjusted to life in a wheelchair and modified it to let him lead a more active life. The film is now being used in various California communities for their International Year of the Handicapped programs. The construction of the prototype wheelchair was partially funded with a Project Grant. Others have involved Renaissance Art and a historical catalogue of Art Gallery exhibits.

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
using a formal or informal remedy. A formal legal solution most often involves hiring a lawyer in preparation for pursuing the case in court. It may also mean using legal help from a local agency. Solving a problem informally means finding resolution outside the courts. Consider several things before making a decision. How serious is the problem? How much time and money are available to resolve it? How important is the issue to you? Will your rights be too expensive to protect? Generally, it isn't worthwhile to spend \$200.00 on a lawyer in order to get back \$100.00. Is there an agency which deals specifically with this sort of problem? Whether you can answer these questions or not, the opportunity to have these and other problems addressed by someone in a

forcefully written complaint or demand letter to the person responsible. You, as an inexperienced person in legal matters, may have no knowledge of the proper legal channels which you should use, and without this information you cannot be of help to yourself. One appointment with the Legal Aid attorney may offer you enough knowledge to write such a complaint. The attorney can give you information about alternative courses of action, possible consequences and recommended strategy involved in your particular case.

So, if serious problems arise and you are a member of the Associated Students, you may make an appointment through the Student Activities Office to see an attorney for help. Remember, we are here to help!

"But what about those students who have no need for Legal Aid or getting issued an International Student ID card; what about those students who, when they take a break from studying are just looking for a good time?"


