





Dear Dr. Mikalson,

Each year for the past 32 years, the City of Santa Rosa, the County of Sonoma and the Santa Rosa Jaycees have sponsored the Luther Burbank Rose Festival and Parade. Over the years, the Festival and Parade have become a traditional spring event in Santa Rosa, drawing participants and spectators from all over Northern California. An integral part of this tradition has always been the fresh floral floats entered by groups here in Sonoma County. This year we are making a special effort to increase the number of floats by encouraging organizations such as yours to enter a float in the parade.

To help you decide whether or not to enter a float, I might point out some of the advantages in doing so. Each year the parade attracts upwards of 25,000 people. Coverage by local news media, including the Press Democrat, KFTY TV-50 and KSRO Radio, greatly extends the number of people who follow the parade. By entering a float in the Rose Parade, your organization would receive substantial recognition by thousands of people throughout Sonoma County. Not only would the advertising value be significant, but you would be viewed as being positively involved with the community. Secondly, this year's first prize cash award for Category I floats - all fresh floral - is \$850.00. You would be eligible to compete for that prize. Finally, you and the members of your organization would receive a great deal of personal satisfaction from participating in a well-respected community tradition.

This year's Rose Parade will be held on Saturday, May 15, 1982. Start time will be 10:00AM. The theme is "The Wine Country in Roses". As I mentioned, first place for Class I floats - all fresh floral - is \$850.00 and a trophy. Second and third place awards for Category I are \$600.00 and \$400.00, respectively, and a trophy. The three winners in the Class II category (non-profit, 25% minimum floral decoration) will each receive a trophy and prize money ranging from \$425.00 for first place to \$200.00 for third place. All three places in Class IIB floats (Commercial, 25% minimum floral decorations) will be awarded trophies.

I would like to encourage you again to enter a float in this year's Rose Parade. Applications are available by calling me at 546-2655 or by writing The Rose Festival Board at P.O. Box 1031, Santa Rosa, Ca. 95402. Entry fee is \$10.00. I look forward to your participation in the 33rd Annual Luther Burbank Rose Parade.

O F F I C I A L R U L E S

RAINBOW RECYCLING CAMPAIGN

PURPOSE: To encourage members of the community to recycle aluminum and bi-metal beverage cans by offering DISCOUNTS on LPs & Recorded Tapes for cans brought in to a Rainbow store and by offering special PRIZES to those who bring in the most cans to Rainbow during the month of February 1982. No purchase is necessary to qualify for the special prizes.

1. DISCOUNT PROGRAM

a. Seven-Up cans - a discount of \$2.00 will be given towards the purchase of any LP or Recorded Tape during the month of February 1982 when an empty Seven-Up can is presented at the time of purchase. The maximum discount on any LP or Recorded Tape is \$2.00. A customer who brings in two cans and who purchases two LPs, for example, is entitled to a \$2.00 discount on each LP purchased.

b. All other cans- A discount of 25¢ will be given during the month of February 1982 when an empty beverage can other than a Seven-Up can is presented at the time of purchase. For example, a customer bringing in one such can will receive a 25¢ discount on the purchase of one LP or Recorded Tape. A customer bringing in two cans would receive a 25¢ discount on each of two LPs or Recorded Tapes purchased.

c. Cans have no cash value other than as stated in paragraphs a and b above.

2. SPECIAL PRIZES PROGRAM

a. Special prizes- will be awarded to the top ten individuals or bona fide groups (boy scouts, high school class etc.) who bring in the most total cans during the month of February 1982. The individual or group bringing in the most cans will be awarded the first prize. The individual or group bringing the second highest total of cans will be awarded the second prize and so on. See the Official List of Prizes attached to this set of Rules. Only cans for which receipts are given (see para. 2c below) will qualify towards totals for prize awards. Receipts must be presented to Rainbow before prizes will be awarded.

2. SPECIAL PRIZES PROGRAM (Cont'd)

b. Weighing Cans - The number of cans brought in will be determined by weight at the rate of 24 cans per pound of weight. Cans must be brought in to Rainbow in plastic or paper bag containers. The customer will first be weighed and then weighed a second time while holding the bag of cans. The difference between the second weighing and the first weighing will be equal to the weight of the cans. This net weight will then be converted to number of cans at the rate of 24 cans per pound. In addition to weighing the individual and the cans, Rainbow reserves the right to actually count the number of cans in the bag if in Rainbow's estimation, the weight registered on the scale appears unusual for the size of the bag.

c. Receipt for Cans- A 3-part receipt will be prepared and a copy given to the individual each time someone brings in at least one pound of cans. A receipt will not be given, for example, if someone brings in three cans, so cans should be accumulated and brought into Rainbow in minimum of one pound increments. The receipt should contain the person or group's name and address, date, Store location, pounds and number of cans brought in. One copy of this form should be given to the customer, one copy kept in the store, and one copy sent to the Office. (Attn: Rolf).

d. Weekly Tally and Results - A sign will be posted in each Rainbow store showing the top 15 individuals or groups bringing in the most cans. Receipts will be tallied and the signs updated once a week showing current leaders.

e. Winners will be announced March 5th and posted in each store the same day. Prizes listed on the official prize list will be awarded by March 31, 1982. In case of unavailability of prizes listed, prizes of equivalent value will be awarded.

f. Applicable taxes - The winners will be responsible for income taxes, if any, imposed directly on the customer by Federal, State, or Local government entities.

g. Can Value - Cans have no cash value. Cans brought in to Rainbow will be donated to local area recyclers.

h. No purchase is necessary to qualify for prizes to be awarded.

3. ELIGIBILITY - The Rainbow Recycling promotion is not available to Rainbow employees, employees' families, shareholders and partners of Rainbow or their families, employees of Seven-Up and their families, and employees of media stations participating in this promotion or their families, and employees of Bay Area Recyclers.
