



Students give 96 pints of blood

Montgomery High School students may have missed a school record in Wednesday's blood drive, but they doubled their previous best during a visit by Sonoma County Community Blood Bank's mobile team.

Ron Walls, a senior, said 96 pints of blood were drawn. That's only 14 short of topping the all-school record set recently by Piner High students.

The Montgomery effort became the second best in the county, according to Mary Lynch, blood bank publicity director.

Walls and Kevin Trainor signed 138 students and faculty for the mobile visit with 127 actually

checked in and 96 accepted. Reasons for being turned away include being ill, having a cold, or not eating a sufficient meal before donating.

Lynch said Walls and Trainor both are multiple donors. Trainor has donated a gallon while still in high school. People can begin donating blood at age 17 with parent or guardian permission.

Other school mobile visits included today's at Sonoma State University, Monday's visit to Upper Lake High, Wednesday at Clear Lake High in Lakeport, and Santa Rosa Junior College's second drive this year from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. April 29 in Doyle Student Center.
