Board Meeting, October 8, 1984

CORRESPONDENCE

The Board received two letters:

a. A letter from Andrew J. Shepard, President and Chairman of the Board of Exchange Bank with the third quarter payment of \$85,000 from the Frank P. Doyle Trust. The payment brings the year-to-date contributions from the trust to \$255,000.

b. A letter from SRJC student Jo Russell commending the staff of the Student Services Office for the tremendous job they are doing.

CONSENT AGENDA

OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL

The Board approved the out-of-state travel request submitted by Bettie Underwood, allowing her to go to Tacoma, Washington, October 29-November 1 at no cost to the District.

INSTRUCTION PROJECT APPROVED

The Board approved the submission of an Improvement of Instruction project to the state to develop one or more instructional courses for the Dietetic Technology program using audio visual equipment and self-paced instruction.

CHANGE ORDER APPROVED

Ceilings of the main cafeteria in the Doyle Student Center will be repainted as part of a change order approved by the Board on the Doyle Center Reroofing/Mechanical Project. The cost of the job, which will encompass 5,500 square feet, is \$2,588.

PG&E GIVES DISTRICT GRANT

The Board accepted a grant of \$112,271 from Pacific Gas and Electric Company to be used for deferred maintenance work on several SRJC heating, ventilating and air conditioning systems.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE APPROVED

Nine campus and community representatives were named by the Board to the 1984-85 Reentry Advisory Committee: Chuck Hamack, veterans affairs director; Rosemary Ward, reentry counselor; Paula Coulson, reentry community liaison; Barbara Surien, health occupations instructor; Alberta Hart, speech department instructor; Tim Birnie, attorney; Cassandra Pulig, Hewlett-Packard; Geoff Perel, vocational rehabilitation; and Jo Russell, CSA representative.

CONSORTIUM MEMBERSHIP RENEWED

The Board approved the district membership in the Nor Cal Community College Computer Consortium for 1984-85 at a fee of \$229.

AUDIO VISUAL EQUIPMENT ACCEPTED

Two Philips Microwave Monitors, totalling \$4,570, were donated to the District by Philips Test and Measuring Instruments. The Board accepted the monitors which will be used by the Audio Visual Department.

DIESEL MOTORS DONATED

Equipment totalling \$20,289.92 was donated to the District's Industrial and Trade Technology Department by Detroit Diesel Allison Division of General Motors and Williams & Lane, Inc. from Berkeley. The equipment, which was accepted by the Board, includes two diesel engines, six liner kits, two gasket sets and special tools.

NOTICE OF COMPLETION FILED

The Board accepted the Notice of Completion on the Doyle Reroofing/Mechanical project and directed the administration to file the notice with the County of Sonoma.

EMERITUS MECHANICAL SYSTEMS TO BE REPAIRED

A proposal to do \$34,127 worth of repairs to the Emeritus Hall mechanical systems as part of the college's Energy Management System project was approved by the Board. Cost of the additional work is covered by a deferred maintenance grant by PG&E.

CHANGE ORDER APPROVED

The Board approved a change order for \$7,000 to bring a 12KV line from the property line onto campus to provide new 12KV service to the District.

TEMPORARY MANAGEMENT POSITION APPROVED:FLORES NAMED TO POST

Bob Flores, student activities assistant, was named to fill the new, temporary position of Scholarship/Recruitment and Schools Relations Coordinator established by the Board Monday night.

The temporary post is a classified management position at range 20.0 (\$1805-\$2193) and is effective through June 1985. Flores will assume the position October 15.

Curt Groninga, associate dean of administrative services, said the temporary position would be reviewed next spring. Should the recommendation be to make the position permanent at that time, it would be brought back to the Board for approval and a full recruitment process would take place.

PORTABLE BUILDINGS TO BE MOVED

The Board authorized the administration to go to bid to remodel 2,240 square feet of portable classroom space and move it from Sonoma State Hospital to the Los Guilucos Training Center.

INTRA-BUDGET TRANSFER APPROVED

More than \$500,000 of interest income earned from the Special Reserves which was transferred to the General Fund last year to balance the budget was moved back into the Special Reserves Monday night by the Board.

RETIREMENT PLAN APPROVED

Upon recommendation of Ron Cataraha, director of personnel, the Board approved a resolution allowing employees who are 60 years of age or older and who have 25 years of credited service with the District to retire.

REFUSE CONTRACT SAVES MONEY

Pacific Sanitary Disposal was awarded the bid for refuse collection for the District for 1984-85 at a cost \$1471.70/month (16% less than the District spent for the same service in 1983-84).

1985-86 SABBATICAL LEAVES GRANTED

The Board approved sabbatical leaves for 1985-86 for the following seven faculty members: **For the academic year:** Rene Peron (Behavioral Sciences), Robert Kelley (English), Georgia M. Barrow (Behavioral Science), Dan Goulart (Music), Maurice Lapp (Art), and Don Emblen (English), and **for the fall only:** Joseph P. O'Neill (Business Administration).

OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL APPROVED FOR MATH DEPARTMENT

Seven members of the Math Department received permission of the Board to attend the American Mathematical Association of Two Year Colleges Conference to be held in New York City October 23-28.

BOARD NAMES NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Trustees Al Maggini and John Jacobs were named by Board President Chris Pedroncelli to serve on a nominating committee to recommend officers for the Board for the coming year.

SURVIVING SPOUSES OF RETIREES RECEIVE FRINGE BENEFITS

The Board approved the extension of medical/dental coverage to qualified surviving spouses of qualified retirees at the fixed rate of \$70/per month.

SRJC's Student Employment Office placed more than 3,000 students in jobs during 1983-84, according to the annual report presented to the Board by Sandy Martinez, coordinator of student employment.

EARLY RETIREMENT PROPOSAL PRESENTED TO THE BOARD

An early retirement program which would allow SRJC certificated employees with 15 years of full time service to the District to retire between the ages of 55 and 64 with full medical/dental coverage provided by the District was presented to the Board by a faculty committee represented by Courtney Anderson. The Board directed Bill Wilber, vice-president of business services, to solicit estimates to have the proposal reviewed by an outside firm.

OLDER WORKER PROGRAM

More than 27 students aged 55 and older have taken part in the college's Older Worker training program, sponsored by the Job Training Partnership Act and funded by the Private Industry Council. Training programs for these students are offered in office occupations, home health aide, and resident manager training.

ENROLLMENT UP SLIGHTLY

Summer enrollment and ADA were up by 15-16% over last summer and fall enrollment is up by 2-3% and increasing daily, according to Jim Menzel, assistant dean of admissions and records.

REPORT ON THIRD YEAR DOYLE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Eighty seven students were eligible this fall for funds through the Third Year Doyle Scholarship program, according to Jim Menzel. Menzel told the Board he would bring them a student profile of the Third Year Doyle Scholarship recipient soon.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Lamont Royer, SRJC controller, presented a budget report to the Board. As of September 17, the college had spent approximately 10.2% of its total budget for 1984-85.

ASB PRESIDENT'S REPORT

One of the major goals of this fall's ASB officers is to improve communication between the ASB and the students, according to Lorna Cooper, ASB president. She thanked the Board and members of the staff for their help in transferring used typewriters from the BOT labs to the library for student use. She also complimented Gene Canevari, assistant dean for student services, for his work in obtaining the donation of two microwave oscilloscopes for the District.

Cooper said the ASB is looking for alternative ways to fund its programs including the possibility of utilizing the revenues of campus vending machines.

She also expressed concern about the new temporary Scholarship/Recruitment position which had just been approved by the Board. She said that by using an on-campus person to fill the position temporarily, she hoped the District wasn't "robbing Peter to pay Paul."

ACADEMIC SENATE PRESIDENT

Academic Senate President Frank Pugh complimented the Board on the action taken during the evening which benefited faculty members including sabbatical leave approvals, professional growth increments, and fringe benefits for surviving spouses of retirees.

Pugh commented on the number of faculty members who serve on District committees and challenged the administration to find a way to thank these people for their work.

Pugh also encouraged the administration to begin working on a procedures manual. He said the faculty will be reviewing grievance policies from five other colleges.

SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT

Superintendent/President Roy Mikalson commented on several pieces of legislation which affect community colleges: **Matriculation:** The Governor vetoed this bill, however \$29 million for a matriculation project is included in the 1985-86 Community College budget being prepared by the Board of Governors; **AB 2808:** This bill, which allows the college to collect material fees for the Administration of Justice Basic Academy, was signed by the Governor; **Differential Funding:** This plan proposes a formula for funding in four main areas: instruction/instructional services, student services, general services, and maintenance/plant operations. Mikalson said the plan would probably not be implemented for two to three years.

Mikalson said CEO's from throughout the state will meet in Sacramento Wednesday to discuss a "hold harmless" clause which will not penalize college that fail to reach their ADA cap this year.

Demos downplay help of SRJC gays

U.S. Sen. Gary Hart will speak Monday at Santa Rosa Junior College about the environmental record of the Democratic presidential and vice presidential candidates. His talk is sponsored by the Gay and Lesbian Student Union, an association the Mondale-Ferraro campaign is trying to downplay.

"We want only the initials of the sponsoring group to be used," said John Bagley, with the Victory '84 Democratic campaign office in San Francisco.

A press release on Hart's visit, to be issued today, will identify the student group by its initials,

GLSU, he said. On Tuesday, in a call to The Press Democrat, he asked that any announcement of the event follow that form.

"Why can't you use just the initials?" he asked.

Bagley contacted the junior college as a possible stop-off for Hart on a West Coast campaign trip and was told college policy requires that campus events must be sponsored by a student organization.

Susan Solstice, with the Gay and Lesbian Student Union, said she was in the Associated Students office when a request for a sponsor came through. Student body president Lorna Jackson Cooper "suggested we take it on," said

Solstice.

The Gay and Lesbian Student Union has sponsored previous events on campus and is familiar with the bureaucratic and logistic maneuvers, she said. Sponsors, she said, take on the responsibility of paperwork, publicity, posters and even security for an event.

On Tuesday, the group was asked to minimize its association with the senator's visit. Solstice said she was asked by Bagley to identify the group only by initials in posters and in press releases.

"It's not being hidden. We're just not emphasizing" the connection, said Solstice.

Bagley called it "an agreement

between me and the president of the club."

Asked if there was an official policy that prohibited using gay organizations for sponsors of campaign events, he said, "No," but added, "This could get out of hand."

Hart is scheduled to speak at the Coop Patio on the college campus. Also invited are Rep. Doug Bosco, D-Occidental; Mary Jadicker, Democratic contender for the 2nd Assembly District; and Assemblyman Dan Hauser, D-Arcata. The 10 a.m. talk is open to the public.

The intent of the senator's visit is to "represent the environmental

stand" of presidential candidate Walter F. Mondale and his running mate Geraldine Ferraro, said Bagley.

"We needed a club," said Bagley. "It's a bureaucratic requirement. It's just a school club," he said.

Asked if he would make the same request from, for example, the campus French club, he said, "It doesn't matter what the club is."

Hart rips Reagan


Stumping for Mondale at SRJC

U.S. Sen. Gary Hart on Monday told an enthusiastic crowd at Santa Rosa Junior College that Ronald Reagan's re-election campaign is rooted in cynicism and fueled by an "election year recovery" that will self-destruct in 1985.

The Colorado senator, whose own presidential campaign foundered against the bulwark of Walter Mondale's traditional Democratic coalition, urged several thousand spectators at the college's Doyle Student Center to cast their votes for the man he opposed last spring.

Although here to promote Mondale's candidacy, it was the Reagan administration that constituted the major focus of Hart's



address. At least three times during the 10-minute speech the one-time George McGovern campaign manager referred to the Reagan re-election effort as "cynical."

"It is based on the proposition that by offering people a few dollars in their pockets in a short-term, election-year recovery, they will turn their backs on all these areas of policies where they disagree fundamentally with this administration," he said.

In an earlier press conference, Hart accused the president of "appealing to individual self-interest, at its best, and greed, at its worst."

Hart hit a variety of Democratic campaign themes during his brief

address, touching on the environment, student aid, involvement in Central America and the nuclear arms race. He also pressed Democratic contentions that fundamentalist evangelists would control Reagan's future appointments to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"I do not believe the people of this state or the young people of this nation want a handful of right-wing media preachers selecting the next Supreme Court of the United States," he said.

But it was the issue Republicans believe is their strongest — the economy — that Hart returned to time and again.

"We are not going to let the extremists of this administration fool us ... because we know this

recovery is paid for with your future," he said to cheers from the crowd, some of whom waved "Hart '88" placards.

"We have mortgaged the future of the young people of this country to pay for this president's re-election and we're not going to let him get away with it."

During the press conference, Hart said a recession is "inevitable" because of huge federal deficits and the country's trade deficit. He said "just about everyone outside the White House" agrees that heavy government borrowing will push interest rates and unemployment up in early 1985.

"That will choke off any recovery we've had," he said.

Hart also accused Reagan of cynicism for running a campaign

based on image and media manipulation.

"You take the president's teleprompter and three-by-five cards away and he's just like any other politician," he said. "He can give speeches but he can't give answers."

Hart predicted that Mondale would overcome Reagan's double-digit lead with a strong campaign in the remaining three weeks before Nov. 6.

"I think this is an October election," he said.



5. The Association must know the education objectives of SRJC in order to "manage by objective."
6. Association members should contribute to the agenda of the Association and/or report on what is "hot" in their area.

The subcommittee believes communication as a process is the key to realizing objectives. The foregoing six points are an attempt to identify some procedural elements.

SRJC's Canevari takes leave

Assistant Dean for Student Services Eugene Canevari, who last month joined students in pressing Santa Rosa Junior College's Board of Trustees to hire someone as his assistant, will take a six-month leave of absence starting Jan. 1.

And, when he returns to the college July 1, he will be a counselor, not an administrator.

Canevari would not say his leave was based solely on the board's hesitance to fill the vacant assistant student activities director position, even though he said one person could not do the job of overseeing student and club activities.

Canevari lost his assistant when Robert Flores moved to the new position of director of scholarships and recruiting. Student leaders immediately asked the board to replace Flores because of the varied services the Student Activities Office must provide.

Trustees put off the request, however, so a committee could study the question. Each time a management position is vacated, the college studies the job to see whether it still is needed.

Now, with Canevari's leave approved by the board Monday, Flores has been reassigned to student activities as of Jan. 1 in his former role. At the Jan. 10 trustees' meeting, Flores is expected to be named director of student activities, Canevari said.

Canevari, with more than 18 years experience guiding student and club activities, said he "has been under a lot of stress. It seemed like time to take time off and to do something else." He has a master's degree in counseling.

"This was an extremely difficult decision to make," he said, "mainly because over the years and more recently I've enjoyed a working relationship with students and have so many close friends. That has carried on through the years."

Tonight I come only to give you some facts of which you may not be aware.

If the issue before us is a matter of money then let us examine the financial status of the Associated Students and the Student Activities Office carefully.

Recently, it was stated that the relationship of the income of the Associated Students and the District expenditures on the Student Activities Office were under examination. This comment was unique in that I had never heard this comparison before. It was the first time I had ever heard the implication that the amount spent by the District in support of Student Activities was somehow dependant on the income of the Associated Students. Never-the-less the expanded statement concerning this comparison seemed to be inaccurate. The total income of the Associated Students for 1983-84 was \$122,000. The 1983-84 District Budget for the Student Activities Office for the same period was \$114,000 and for this year is \$106,000. This District expenditure includes the salaries of the Assistant Student Activities Advisor and myself. (The Assistant Dean of Students). Since almost all of the income of the Associated Students is spent as part of the financial economy of the District, by this comparison, the District is still making money. I dislike this comparison and I do not believe it to be germaine -- But the fact is that the income of the Associated Students is now in jeopardy because the Assistant Student Activities Advisor's Position is vacant. One of the Assistant's responsibilities is to organize and supervise student card sales that are responsible for the bulk of the income of the Associated Students. Perhaps this is a good time to remind ourselves that over the years the Associated Students, under the direction of the Student

Activities Advisors, have poured more than one-million dollars into the economy of the college.

As part of my administrative tasks, and with no additional compensation, I teach graded units. Using some rough figures, I estimate that I have personally brought to the college some \$200,000 in ADA Funds, at no extra cost to the District.

A different type of fact is that the staff of the Student Activities Office consists of four people: The Assistant Dean of Students,

the Assistant Activities Advisor, the part time Associated Students' Accounts Manager and the part time Associated Students' Secretary.

The total cost of the Associated Students Accounts Manager and the Associated Students Secretary is paid by the Associated Students. Thus, four weeks ago, with 5 1/2 days of "transistion time" the District portion of the Student Activities Office staff was cut in half. The income, the recruiting, the retention, the services to students cannot be maintained, are not being maintained with half of the District Staff removed.

But perhaps we are not talking about money only. Recently in a conversation with Dr. Mikalson, he referred to me, in the friendliest of terms, as a Dinosaur. I believe he meant that I was one of the few assistant deans still dealing directly with students, and yet this next weekend there is a state-wide student leadership conference spearheaded by deans encouraged by the chancellor's office. A conference aimed at re-establishing the state-wide student government organization. I believe that those community colleges who have removed direct high level administrative support from Student Government and Student Activities now realize that they have made a mistake. ^{We can} AVERT that same error tonight!

In a later conversation, I reminded Dr. Mikalson that I am not much impressed by surveys of what other community colleges are doing, or not doing. If we are to be the best -- and I believe that we are -- then there are a whole host of things that we should be doing that other community colleges are not. One of

those things is maintaining our support for a strong student government and student activities program.

Over the past 19 years the Associated Students, and this Board of Trustees have been involved in a love-affair. At times it has been a little bumpy, to be sure, like any love affair, but the students and the board have always shared several things in common. The students have always known that the board loves this college as much as they do. Like the board, for 19 years, in the best of times and in the worst of times student government has acted to protect this college as an institution and to provide for the best interests of its students. This did not happen by accident. The Associated Students had advisors who did their jobs with skill and who also love this college.

For the past five years, and more, and for a variety of reasons, the future of Student Activities on this campus has been in doubt. The personal stress generated by these repeated uncertainties has been difficult for me. Even now, the rumor mill has it that if the Assistant Activities Advisor position is filled then my position is in jeopardy. Despite this stress and uncertainty, and with the help of a small but very dedicated staff, and numerous -- numerous dedicated students, the Associated Students and the Student Activities Office have carried on and have continued to build, in the words of Dr. Mikalson, "A Model Student Activities Program. . . "

I confess that I am a little tired -- I am personally tired just now of the stress of unsuccessfully trying to do the work of two people. I am also tired of over the years defending a program that needs no defense!

OAK TREE REPORT

Bill Bowen, manager of grounds and custodians, reported on the status of oak trees on campus. The care, maintenance and planting of oak trees on campus has been Bowen's first priority, he said. The college currently has 277 oak trees on campus. Bowen said he is in constant contact with the Sonoma County Agriculture Commission tree experts as well as University of California Extension arboriculturists as to the care of the trees.

ASB PRESIDENT

Lorna Jackson-Cooper, ASB president, announced the new ASB officers who will take office January 18: Thomas Dearth, president; Jeff Bailey, executive vice-president; Dennis Stevens, vice president; Kelly Crawford, treasurer; Kimi Sung Dixon, recording secretary; Kimberly Marouka, corresponding secretary; and five freshmen and five sophomore representatives. Jackson-Cooper said the CSA was investigating a proposal to utilize funds from the vending machines as a stable source of income for the ASB. Students were also investigating operation of the Bookstore and Cafeteria to see if they could renegotiate additional income for the ASB or lower prices for students.

Students were still dismayed, she said, that the Student Activities Assistant had not been replaced and were hopeful that any future decision which effect the students would be discussed with the students before action was taken. Jackson-Cooper praised Gene Canevari, Assistant Dean of Student Activities, who is leaving the position on January 1. After 37 semesters in Student Activities, Canevari will be "deeply missed," she said. "We love you and you will be in our hearts and minds."

ACADEMIC SENATE PRESIDENT

Frank Pugh, Academic Senate president, praised the work of the Fringe Benefit Committee, particularly Izzy Derkos, and reviewed the accomplishments of the past six months: a. medical coverage for retired spouses, b. action taken toward an early retirement proposal for faculty; c. summer pay issue resolved; d. formation of a Vocational Education committee in the Academic Senate; e. planning underway for a faculty/administration workshop; and f. things were looking hopeful for both the salary and the grievance committees. He wished the Board a satisfying New Year and Christmas.

SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT

Dr. Roy Mikalson, superintendent/president, added his compliments to the faculty who turned in sabbatical leave reports. He said the reports were the finest he had ever read. He said the Governor was putting the budget together and that the Department of Finance was giving mixed signals as to their support of increased funding for community colleges. Mikalson urged Board members and staff to send the Governor a telegram or quick letter urging him to fully fund the proposal submitted by the colleges' Board of Governors. Mikalson complimented the college's Criminal Justice Training Center and said he had heard that Oregon State was referring its students to the center for criminal justice training. In a short sports report, Mikalson praised the accomplishments of SRJC's teams: Women's Cross-Country won the Camino Norte Conference Title; Men's Cross-Country took second in the conference; the Football team won the CNC Title and was third in Northern California; the Soccer team was undefeated in conference play and took second in Northern California; four wrestlers made the state meet; Women's Volleyball took fourth in CNC play; the Men's Basketball team won the Cypress Tournament; and the Women's Basketball team placed third in the recent College of the Redwoods Tournament. In addition, two SRJC football players made the All-American team, five were named to the top Northern California team, and two players were named to the second place Northern California team.

Please forgive this additional form letter, but Bev is getting as tired as I am.

In regards to the filling of the Assistant Student Activities Advisor position, we won and we lost. The students were able to finally negotiate a 40 hour per week position at the lowest management level. This was what I asked for two months ago and received a flat refusal. However, the position was to be "reviewed" in June along with the reorganization of the Student Activities Office by a committee of three board members and three administrators (I was not included).

After a great deal of soul searching I made one of the most difficult decisions of my life. I am going on leave from January 1, 1985 until July 1, 1985. My replacement will be my former assistant, Mr. Bob Flores. He will have working with him the new activities assistant. In July, I will not be returning to Student Activities. I will be re-assigned to another position, as a counselor.

It has become very apparent that the college wants to do something different with Student Activities. It is very difficult to give up a program that I've spent 19 years building, but I think it is best for students and for me.

Thank you so much for your letters of support. I appreciate each of you very much!

~~Mrs. Pedroncelli~~, Gentlemen of the Board,

Tonight I come only to give you some facts of which you may not be aware.

If the issue before us is a matter of money then let us examine the financial status of the Associated Students and the Student Activities Office carefully.

Recently, it was stated that the relationship of the income of the Associated Students and the District expenditures on the Student Activities Office were under examination. This comment was unique in that I had never heard this comparison before. It was the first time I had ever heard the implication that the amount spent by the District in support of Student Activities was somehow dependant on the income of the Associated Students. Never-the-less the expanded statement concerning this comparison seemed to be inaccurate. The total income of the Associated Students for 1983-84 was \$122,000. The 1983-84 District Budget for the Student Activities Office for the same period was \$114,000 and for this year is \$106,000. This District expenditure includes the salaries of the Assistant Student Activities Advisor and myself. (The Assistant Dean of Students). Since almost all of the income of the Associated Students is spent as part of the financial economy of the District, by this comparison, the District is still making money. I dislike this comparison and I do not believe it to be germane -- But the fact is that the income of the Associated Students is now in jeopardy because the Assistant Student Activities Advisor's Position is vacant. One of the Assistant's responsibilities is to organize and supervise student card sales that are responsible for the bulk of the income of the Associated Students. Perhaps this is a good time to remind ourselves that over the years the Associated Students, under the direction of the Student

Activities Advisors, have poured more than one-million dollars into the economy of the college.

As part of my administrative tasks, and with no additional compensation, I teach graded units. Using some rough figures, I estimate that I have personally brought to the college some \$200,000 in ADA Funds, at no extra cost to the District.

A different type of fact is that the staff of the Student Activities Office consists of four people: The Assistant Dean of Students,

the Assistant Activities Advisor, the part time Associated Students' Accounts Manager and the part time Associated Students' Secretary. The total cost of the Associated Students Accounts Manager and the Associated Students Secretary is paid by the Associated Students. Thus, four weeks ago, with 5 1/2 days of "transistion time" the District portion of the Student Activities Office staff was cut in half. The income, the recruiting, the retention, the services to students cannot be maintained, are not being main- tained with half of the District Staff removed.

But perhaps we are not talking about money only. Recently in a conversation with Dr. Mikalson, he referred to me, in the friendliest of terms, as a Dinosaur. I believe he meant that I was one of the few assistant deans still dealing directly with students, and yet this next weekend there is a state-wide student leadership conference spearheaded by deans encouraged by the chancellor's office. A conference aimed at re-establishing the state-wide student government organization. I believe that those community colleges who have removed direct high level administrative support from Student Government and Student Activities now realize that they have made a mistake. ^{We can} AVERT that same error tonight!

In a later conversation, I reminded Dr. Mikalson that I am not much impressed by surveys of what other community colleges are doing, or not doing, if we are to be the best -- and I believe that we are -- then there are a whole host of things that we should be doing that other community colleges are not. One of

those things is maintaining our support for a strong student government and student activities program.

Over the past 19 years the Associated Students, and this Board of Trustees have been involved in a love-affair. At times it has been a little bumpy, to be sure, like any love affair, but the students and the board have always shared several things in common. The students have always known that the board loves this college as much as they do. Like the board, for 19 years, in the best of times and in the worst of times student government has acted to protect this college as an institution and to provide for the best interests of its students. This did not happen by accident. The Associated Students had advisors who did their jobs with skill and who also love this college.

For the past five years, and more, and for a variety of reasons, the future of Student Activities on this campus has been in doubt. The personal stress generated by these repeated uncertainties has been difficult for me. Even now, the rumor mill has it that if the Assistant Activities Advisor position is filled then my position is in jeopardy. Despite this stress and uncertainty, and with the help of a small but very dedicated staff, and numerous -- numerous dedicated students, the Associated Students and the Student Activities Office have carried on and have continued to build, in the words of Dr. Mikalson, "A Model Student Activities Program. . . Canevari leaves activities office

"For the past five years,...the future of student activities on this campus has been in doubt. The personal stress generated by these repeated uncertainties has been difficult for me," Gene Canevari, student activities advisor, told the college board of trustees at their November 13 meeting.

After almost 19 years, Canevari will step down from his post in the wake of a controversy over replacing his assistant, who was promoted to another position in October.

Canevari, who said he has been working 10 hours a day plus weekends to try to maintain programs at the student activities office (SAO), will take a six-month leave of absence at the end of the semester and return in July as a counselor.

"It was more than one person could do," he said.

Bob Flores, the assistant activities advisor who was assigned to a temporary position in scholarships and recruitment, will return to the SAO in January to take over Canevari's job.

When Flores was promoted at the October 8 meeting of the board of trustees, the board failed to authorize the hiring of a new activities assistant. Despite an outpouring of student support for filling the position — sending a dozen letters to the trustees which an-

the November board meeting — the trustees declined to make a commitment to replace Flores.

Instead the board appointed a committee of three trustees and three ASB officers to meet and make recommendations to the administration, which was studying whether or not to fill the position.


"The delay is sheer rules and all you have to go through," said College President Roy Mikalson, who explained that every time an administrative position is vacated, a management review committee — made up of himself, Vice President Bill Wilber and Vice President Brook Tauzer, plus three trustees — "look at data and decide which way we want to go."

The committee also compares the job with those in other colleges. "In colleges our size, that position is filled by one person," said Mikalson.

When asked if he thought there was a connection between Canevari's decision to leave and the loss of his assistant, Mikalson said, "I don't believe so, because he (Canevari) knew we were putting an assistant back in."

"We could have had someone in that position in a week or ten days after the November meeting," Mikalson said, adding that the administration was trying to identify the pool of applicants at the college and thought that Canevari had someone in mind.

"We put together a job descrip-

got sick," explained Mikalson. When Canevari returned to work, a few days after the Thanksgiving holiday, he had already decided to leave student activities.

"I would have gone through to at least June," Canevari said, but made the decision to leave "after the assistant's promotion was

Flores, who is going through two job changes in one semester, said, "I feel great" about working with student activities again, but said he was returning to the SAO with "mixed emotions, since I worked with Gene for three

ASB President Lorna Cooper told the board of trustees at their December 10 meeting that "many students are dismayed and disheartened" by the board's lack of action on an assistant advisor, which has had a "detrimental effect" on students.

Cooper eulogized Canevari, saying "he has been one of the most instrumental persons in making my

Bloodless coup

Despite an outpouring of support from students, the community, and the **The Oak Leaf**, the Board of Trustees has failed to refill the position of assistant student activities advisor. Now, as a direct result of this inaction, Gene Canevari has resigned his position as assistant dean of student activities.

The administration has been dragging its feet for two months since Bob Flores' promotion to scholarship recruitment and school relations coordinator was announced at the October 8 board meeting. They have systematically ignored the will of the students in this issue and have, perhaps, forgotten for whom this college exists.

The board put the entire student activities program in jeopardy by referring the matter to committee. And everyone knows how long it takes to make decisions by committee.

When he lost his staff support, Canevari was crushed by the burden of work. He labored under the stress of uncertainty, and that stress eventually wore him down. Despite putting in countless extra

hours, Canevari admitted he just couldn't handle the staggering work load. He has said, "I am personally tired just now of the stress of unsuccessfully trying to do the work of two people. I am also tired of, over the years, defending a program that *needs no defense*."

To what possible motives can we attribute the administration's action? The first possibility is financial. Obviously, without an assistant advisor the budget for the SAO is lower. But, there is also a more subtle aspect to the financial question. Canevari is ranked as an assistant dean — a more costly position/title than his replacement (Flores) will hold. If a new assistant is eventually hired, that person will undoubtedly make less than Flores, who held the position for three years. Overall, the budget will be cut when Canevari leaves.

Akin to this is President Mikalson's belief that assistant dean is too high a ranking for a person who deals directly with students. He plans to reclassify the position when Canevari steps down.

Thirdly, by waging this bloodless war, the administration has caused Canevari to capitulate, and has, thereby, silenced an outspoken champion of student issues.

Gene Canevari has been a part of this campus far longer than the administrators in Bailey Hall. How much easier will their jobs be without this present reminder that SRIC exists to serve the
